MUST BUY GARBAGE CANS.

Restaurants Will Have to Provide Metallic Receptacles.
(Ogden, June 6.—Forty-one local restaurants and eating houses must purchase metallic garbage cans at once, or be prosecuted under the state pure food law, according to Fred C. Nelsbitt, local state deputy to the food and dairy commissioner, who has just completed a thorough investigation of sanitary conditions at Ogden restaurants.

BEES ARE MUCH BUSIER.

Inspector Orders Fumigation of a Number of Colonies.
(Ogden, June 6.—That the bee industry in Weber county is of growing importance is shown by the report of Charles R. Pettigrew, bee inspector, filed with the county commissioners today. There are at present 2,422 bee colonies in the county, an increase of 228 over the count of last year.
