

Salt Lake County's New Hospital and Infirmary as It Will Look When Finished



West Elevation of Proposed County Hospital, Costing \$120,000, to Be Erected at Twelfth South and State Streets.

BIDS for Salt Lake county's new infirmary and hospital building will be called for in about six weeks, and work on the new structure will be started by early fall, according to the plans of the board of county commissioners, who discussed the designs for the building yesterday.

Plans for the building were drawn by J. A. Headlund, and these were selected by the commissioners from the fifteen sets of plans entered by local architects in the competition. The building will be "T"-shaped, measuring 142 feet in its greatest

length, and the wings at each end will be 30x70 feet. The hospital building will be three stories, with full basement, and the exterior will be of pressed brick and terra cotta, with the basement of cement, with cut stone above the grade.

The hospital proper will occupy the third floor. This will have ample accommodations for twenty patients, with two large wards and smaller wards and private rooms for patients. Two perfectly appointed and equipped operating rooms are provided for, with sterilizing and dressing rooms and rooms for supplies, besides ample bath and toilet facilities. The first and second floors will be fitted up for infirm male inmates,

with a large lounging room on each floor. Sun parlors, conservatories and screened porches are provided for each floor. Corridors as well as the physicians' rooms and operating rooms will be fitted with tile floors and wainscoting and communication will be afforded by a large electric elevator and an electric dumb waiter. The basement will contain the kitchen, laundry, a dining room large enough to seat 100, store rooms and other conveniences, and one wing will be fitted into apartments for servants, with baths and toilets.

Besides the diet kitchen on the third floor, there will be service kitchens on the first and second floors in connection with the dumb

waiters to facilitate serving of meals to those who are unable to go to the dining room.

The commissioners allowed the architect six weeks to prepare detailed plans for the building and incorporate a few minor changes as suggested by the board and the county physicians. At the expiration of this time the commissioners will advertise for bids for the erection of the building. The approximated estimated cost of the building is \$120,000.

The new hospital is to be erected at the corner of Twelfth South and State streets. On its completion the present county infirmary will be remodeled and used for infirm female charges of the county.

MORITZ ESTATE IS VALUED AT \$300,000

Greater Part of Deceased Brewer's Fortune Left to Widow Unconditionally.

Jacob Moritz, the Salt Lake brewer who died June 9 at Weilsbaden, Germany, left an estate valued at \$300,000 to his widow, Lahela Moritz, with the exception of three bequests of \$2,500 each. His will was filed for probate in the district court yesterday, with a petition of Mrs. Moritz and Oscar Lehmann and Emil Lehmann asking that they be appointed administrators in accordance with the provisions of the will.

BEATEN WITH TELEPHONE RECEIVER, ALLEGES WIFE

Yesterday's Farmington mistake registered through a divorce suit was that made by Alice Alder and Albert F. Alder, June 1, 1908. Mrs. Alder charges cruelty and non-support, saying that her husband has been in the habit of beating her, and on occasions has used a telephone transmitter and a switch with which to administer his beatings. On one occasion, Mrs. Alder says, her husband locked her in a room, and while he was beating her the neighbors called the police. Mrs. Alder wants the custody of their one child, 14 months old, and \$20 a month alimony.

FINED FOR MISLABELING.

Symms-Utah Grocery Company Enters Plea of Guilty. The Symms-Utah Grocery company entered a plea of guilty to the charge of mislabeling a shipment of extract of lemon in violation of the pure food law, in the United States district court, and was fined \$25 and costs, amounting to \$42.95, by Judge John A. Marshall yesterday. The shipment in question was labeled "Double Strength Concentrated Extract of Lemon," when in reality it was dilute terpeneless lemon extract. The goods were consigned to William Hunter company, Elko, Nev.

BUILDING PERMITS.

Building permits for the first week of August show a total estimated cost of only \$15,000, as nearly all of the fourteen issued were for minor additions. August permits last year amounted to \$1,750,000 and there is little chance for equaling this record during the present month. The only permit issued yesterday was to L. M. Smith for an alteration, to a brick office at 126 South Main street, to cost \$100.
