EAST WAITS WITH INTEREST REBUT OF NEW FOOTBALL RULES

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—This week will see the new football rules brought out for public inspection at most of the big eastern colleges.

Yale, completing a two weeks' season of elementary practice at Lakeville, Conn., on Tuesday, will be back on Yale field Wednesday for her opening game with the Wesleyan eleven.

Probably the best game of the week will be at New Haven on Saturday, when Yale plays Syracuse.

The new rules place a premium on speed and agility and call for more trick plays, more strategy and more quick thinking.

The defeat of Pennsylvania by Uris Saturday is not only an indication that the rules will develop many surprises.

One prominent expert is quoted as declaring that under the new rules he can develop an offensive play which team can stop and which ordinary football material he can develop a team which is practically certain to score on opponents who have not been generally conceded that heavy men will be less valuable than before.
