Brooklyn Cop Plays Office Boy Act and May Lose Job

New York, Oct. 12.—The nonchalance and dispatch with which Frank Rogers, a Brooklyn policeman, "killed" two close relatives, when his purpose in seeking a leave of absence was to attend a ball game, may cost him his position.

On September 2, Rogers reported his brother's death at Troy, N. Y., and was excused from duty. When he asked to be away again on September 21, because of his father's death, likewise at Troy, Deputy Commissioner Reynolds started an investigation. From his report he received information that the men whose funerals Rogers had received permission to attend had died years ago and that they were not even relatives of the patrolman.

When confronted with this evidence, Rogers admitted the only burial he had really attended was that of his wife's pet dog.

ONE BURNS NOW HAS A FOOTBALL EVEN
