Commercial Club Meeting.

The regular monthly meeting of the Garland Commercial Club was held in the club rooms, Monday evening, March 13th.

The first business brought before the meeting, after the minutes had been read and duly approved, was the advisability of having the secretary write the Oregon Short Line Railroad Company in an effort to secure better passenger service from Garland, and if possible induce them to put on a train that would connect at Brigham with the Cache Valley train. After the matter had been thoroughly discussed the assistant secretary was instructed to write the Railroad Company along the lines stated above.

The Base Hall situation for 1906 was then discussed. It was agreed that a committee of three, consisting of W. P. Eaton, M. D. Evans and M. A. Boothe, be appointed to meet with a committee to be appointed by the Garland Athletic Association to meet and arrange a schedule if possible to include the various towns of the county.

The matter of getting an exchange of courtesies from the various other clubs of the state was then considered and the secretary instructed to write them in an effort to secure same. Several bills were presented for payment and approved. The meeting was then adjourned for one month.

Town Board Meeting.

The Town Board met in regular session Tuesday night, March 13th and various matters of importance were brought up for discussion and settlement. Prest. Rowe was in the chair, there also being present Trustees Lant, Secrist, Vanauddeln and Edwards, besides several prominent business men of the town.

The first business to be dealt with was the treasurer's report which was to the effect that he had received \$90.99 from the county treasurer for taxes due from assessment for the year 1905 and was instructed to cover same into the treasury.

The resignation of Town Marshall W. R. Vanfleet was then brought up for consideration and finally accepted. The petitions of T. E. Secrist and George Henrie, both showing a long list of signers were then read by Chairman Rowe, as was also a petition requesting that the wages paid the Town Marshall be reduced, the funds to be saved thereby to go toward improving our public highways and side-walks. Mr. Mosiah Evans, who was present, then spoke at some length and earnestly discouraged the idea of a reduction on the ground that we were desirous of securing an efficient Marshall, one who would be willing to devote his entire time to the town; we must pay him the salary paid the retiring Marshall, viz. \$60.00. After the matter had been quite thoroughly discussed, a resolution was passed to the effect that the resolution to reduce the Marshall's wages be not granted. Geo. Henrie was then appointed Town Marshall to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of W. R. Vanfleet. The offices of the secretary and treasurer were left unchanged and are held by W. P. Eaton and James Jensen, respectively.

The report of the committee on the side-walk ordinance was then asked to report, and stated that it was the desire of the people that such an ordinance be passed, side-walks to consist of cinders and gravel. The president was then instructed to have an ordinance formulated for a side-walk district, with side-walks to be not less than 6 feet wide, grade to be established by an engineer, subject to the approval of the president of the town board.

A resolution was then passed to the effect that the parties owning the deep ditch running east and west on Factory and Depot streets be notified that same is a detriment to the town and must be removed.

After other matters of minor importance were discussed the meeting stood adjourned.
