The purpose of the company as set forth in the articles is to construct and operate an electric railroad from Provo to Logan. The incorporators are the same as those of the Ogden Rapid Transit company and the officers are as follows: David Eccles, president; M. S. Browning, vice-president; C. H. Kirchner, secretary; H. H. Spencer, treasurer, and these with H. H. Rolapp, N. C. Flygare and R. S. Joyce, are the directors.

It is stated that there will be 150 miles of track laid at an average cost of \$12,000 per mile.—Utah State Journal.
