Mutual Co-operation Drainage District.

200 ACRES SECURED

6,000 Feet of Drain Tile Ordered and will be Laid Within Thirty Days. Very Desirable Location.

C. F. Brown, drainage engineer, and ten prominent farmers of the northern part of this city have organized a mutual co-operation drainage district comprising 200 acres of land. The office of experiment stations, the U. S. Dept. of Agricultural and the Utah experiment station are co-operating with the farmers and have made surveys and provided the plans.

The government is buying \$200 worth of the tile to be used, the farmers paying for the balance and doing all the labor. Over 6,000 feet of drain tile will be put in within the next thirty days. The tile has been ordered. The land selected for the experimental farm lies in the neighborhood of the Austin Farm.

Town Board Meeting.

The regular monthly meeting of the Town Board of Garland was held in the rooms of the Commercial Club, Tuesday night, June 5th. In the absence of Prest. W. H. Rowe, John T. Lant was appointed to occupy the chair. After the minutes of the previous meeting had been read and approved, and other matters of minor importance disposed of, John T. Lant, chairman of the committee on Adjustment of License for Peddle Wagons, recommended that the meat peddler's license be raised to equal the sum charged local butchers. The matter was quite thoroughly discussed by the Board, which resulted in the passing of a resolution to the effect that section 10, line 6 of the Town Ordinances, be amended by striking out the word \$3, and inserting the word \$5.00, thus making the license of meat peddlers equal that of the town butchers.

The report of the Building Committee was then asked for, and Trustee T. F. Secrist reported that the town building was practically completed and was now ready for the placing of the jail cells. The Town Clerk was then instructed to notify the Salt Lake Hardware Co., the company from which the jail cells were purchased, that the building is now ready for placing cells in position and to request that they send a man up to Garland at an early date to attend to the matter.

In the absence of Prest. Rowe, as stated above, the Drainage Committee was somewhat handicapped in submitting its report. The matter was, however, discussed at considerable length and the most feasible drainage routes discussed. The matter of procuring the necessary material for drain boxes, etc., was left in the hands of Marshal Henrie with authority to procure the necessary material.

The committee on establishing town grade also submitted its report, which was to the effect that a series of surveys had been made, but owing to the absence of Engineer Wheelon, was unable to report the extent of the work done. The matter was left in the hands of the marshal to confer with the engineer and together take such steps as they deemed necessary in establishing the grade.

The marshal was also instructed and authorized to procure the necessary globes to fit up the light system in the town wherever he found the globes burned out.
