Impressive funeral services were held at the Garland hall Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock, many of the friends of the family being in attendance. The services were in charge of Rev. J. V. Cody, Baptist Minister of Corinne. The singing was furnished by members of the ward choir under the direction of Jos. Kirkham. Rev. Cody read from the Scripture and made some very consoling and comforting remarks.

The casket and stand were literally covered with floral offerings. The pall bearers were Bp. W. L. Grover, W. D. Lewis, J. C. Wheelon and G. W. Austin. After the services a large cortege followed the remains to the cemetery.

Mr. and Mrs. Campbell have the sympathy of the entire community in their sad bereavement.

### Leg Broken and Foot Crushed.

Thursday evening at about 10 o'clock, Peter Fowler of this city who is employed at the power house in the Bear River Canyon, had the misfortune of being caught in the machinery at the plant and sustained a broken leg and had his foot quite badly crushed. The leg was broken twice just above the ankle.

The family were notified by telephone and Mr. Wheelon went to the power plant early Friday morning and took Mr. Fowler to Salt Lake for treatment. At last reports he was resting quietly.

Mrs. Eva C. Wilcox, the post-master, complains of being considerably annoyed or late by children and other persons constantly ringing up the post office and inquiring if the mail is in, has the mail been distributed, has the mail closed, etc, and other questions that can be answered by consulting the time tables that are published for the benefit of the public generally. Mrs. Wilcox desired that we submit a few facts for the consideration of those who have been in the habit of constantly ringing the post-office for such information. The following will be useful to those who desire to become posted in these matters: The mail arrives from the south at 11:35 a. m. and 7 p. m. and is distributed as soon as it reaches the office. The mail closes for the south bound trains at 8:15 a. m. and 3:05 p. m. Heretofore children coming out of school at noon, have also given the postmaster considerable annoyance by flocking into the office and asking for mail that has been previously called for by their parents. Sometimes three and four children of the same family call four and five times a day for mail that has gone out early in the day. It seems but a habit and should be discouraged. The post-office department has issued an order forbidding postmasters to allow school children to thus through the office and ask for mail. Often important letters are lost by trusting them to the care of small children.
