Temperance Talks.

Mrs. Lulu Loveland Shepard, of the W. C. T. U., the famous lecturer and advocate of temperance, prohibition and purity, who has been touring the United States for the past 16 or 18 years, delivered a very interesting lecture on the subject of "The Saloon's Responsibility for Ruined Homes" at the Garland hall Tuesday evening. The hall was well filled with people from this city and Tremonton, where Mrs. Shepard lectured Monday night. The main object of these lectures is to open up the way for the organization of Republican Temperance Leagues that will send men to the Legislature who will work for State-Wide Prohibition.

Bp. A. R. Capener was chairman of the meeting and the congregation joined in singing Temperance songs. Opening song "W. C. T. U. Marching Song." Prayer by Rev. Dr. White of the Tremonton Baptist Church. Singing "Out for Prohibition." Piano solo, Miss Alta Harris. Mrs. Shepard then took the floor and in an able and eloquent address pointed out the evils of saloons to a community and made a strong plea for Prohibition.

At the close of her lecture she was tendered a hearty vote of thanks.

Mrs. Hazel Chapman furnished the audience with a beautiful vocal solo and Miss Mary Burns was the accompanist for the evening.

After a collection was taken to defray the expense of securing Prohibition literature, and singing the "White Ribbon Rally Song," the benediction was pronounced by Joseph Jensen.

At 1 p. m. Wednesday Mrs. Shepard delivered a talk to the ladies on "Purity" at the Stake Tithing office.
