FROM AUSTRALIA.

Elder John P. Stevens Writes About Conditions in That Land.

ADRIAN, SO. AUSTRALIA, Feb. 10, 1902.

ERRATA:

It is some time since I wrote my last letter to your paper, and I will now endeavor to write a few lines for the benefit of my many friends and acquaintances in Summit county, who are interested in my welfare and the cause I represent.

The country has changed somewhat since I wrote you last, for then flowers were in bloom and nature smiled but the rays of a tropical sun have changed the landscape from a beautiful green to a dull gray, and now nothing is left to indicate the spots where nature was dressed so beautifully; and looking in either direction the eye can see nothing but parched, withered vegetation which looks extremely uninviting to the weary traveler.

We have summer now and for days in succession hot winds blow from the north which reminds one of the hot air from a furnace. It is nothing for the thermometer to register 110 in the shade, and this intense heat continues both night and day for weeks at a time. The heat has been so intense at different periods that it seemed to destroy the instinct of fear in wild animals and birds, and they would permit anyone to capture them and would seem oblivious of their surroundings, apparently not knowing or caring what became of them.

The crops of this country is its scarcity of water, and in many localities huge cisterns and reservoirs are constructed to catch the rain water, which is preserved for use during the hot season. In many localities the people depend exclusively on rain water for domestic purposes. Rains, as a rule, are not very frequent in summer, but in winter we are favored nearly every day with a shower.

The sheep owners here for several years had a very serious time of it. I am informed from reliable sources that they have been compelled to kill the lambs to save the lives of the old ones for the water supply has been so uncertain that only a limited number could find sufficient water to sustain life. Tens of thousands of sheep have been killed each year, besides the many which have perished by thirst.

The government owns the railroads here and transportation is much cheaper than in America, but the cars are old fashioned, the seats are not cushioned and after riding in the coaches for eight or ten hours, one sighs for our modern American cars.

It has been said by people in America that Australia was a good place for a poor man, in fact it has been said it was a poor man's paradise. This is not the case, and if any one still believes the country is a good place to gain a livelihood, all they need is to come here and get their eyes opened. I am acquainted with men who are clerking in stores for \$1.50 per week. Five dollars is considered good wages for an average work's work. There are hundreds of honest men out of employment and times are very dull. The crops of the farmers for several years have been a total failure, and now the government is furnishing seed wheat to the farmers for the coming year.

We are making very good progress in our work here, and have found the people as a rule, very hospitable. The newspapers here treat us very well, for they have published several articles in defense of accusations brought against us by our adversaries. We have large, attentive audiences at all of our meetings. We also have many friends who are not afraid to speak a word in defense of us and our cause. We find that our greatest adversaries are those professing
