At that time, Cusick stated, Crowe had a dark mustache and dark hair, while today he is clean shaven and his hair has turned to gray.

John E. Cox, secretary of the D. A. & M. society and member of the state board of horticulture, died at his home in Salt Lake city Sunday morning after a month's battle with typhoid fever. The funeral services were held at the Thirty-first ward meeting house at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon.
