NEW MINING COMPANY.

The Ely Waneta Mining & Milling Company has filed articles of incorporation with the county clerk. Spanish Fork is named as the principal place of business. The capital stock is \$50,000, divided into one million shares of the par value of five cents each, based on the valuation of the following mining claims in Weaver mining district, White Pine county, Nevada. Waneta No. 2, Contact Nos. 1 and 2, Daisy, Black Jack, Star, Jennie Nos. 1 and 2, Cinderella No. 2, Mary Nos. 1 and 2. The company also has a lease on the Cinderella. The directors and officers are: William B. Hughes, president; Benjamin Argyle, vice-president; George D. Snell, secretary and treasurer; William L. Boyack and Moses B. Gay.

The company's property is situated about three and a half miles west of the hot springs in Steptoe valley, and about fifteen miles north of the smelter being built at McGillis. It has a well defined vein of quartz and spar carrying lead, silver and some gold. A shaft is down twenty feet on the vein and an assay from the ore encountered shows 25 per cent lead and five ounces silver, \$1.20 gold. The board of directors will meet tonight and let a contract to Walter S. Jones and Dell Lambson to sink the shaft on down to the 100-foot level. The company has a spring on their ground, also plenty of pine and cedar for timbering. Said ground was located by B. F. Woodward, Dell Lambson and M. B. Gay, and promoted by B. F. Woodward and Walter S. Jones.

DRILLED INTO MISSED HOLES.

Two Miners Injured by Explosion of Giant Powder.

Last Saturday an Austrian miner, employed at the Yampa, drilled into a missed hole. An explosion followed and the miner was injured on the chest, right arm and scalp. He was taken to St. Mark's hospital Sunday morning and it is hoped he will recover.

Sunday afternoon James Williams, employed at the Highland Boy mine, drilled into a "missed hole" and as a result was seriously, although not fatally, injured. His arm and shoulder were badly wrenched, and he sustained several bad cuts in the face. Mr. Williams was removed to his home, where he is now under the care of a local physician. Should his condition become worse, however, he will be sent to a Salt Lake hospital.

SOME HINTS ABOUT EGGS.

Popular Time for Cooking—How Their Freshness May Be Judged.

The fresher eggs are the longer time they require for boiling. In timing the boiling remember that they should be put into water already boiling in the same pan or skillet.

To boil them very hard in order to slice them or prepare them for a mayonnaise they should cook for ten minutes. For eating the soft-boiled egg is supposed to be the most digestible, and this is boiled for from three to five minutes.

One of the best ways to judge the freshness of eggs is to place them in a pan of cold water. Those that sink soonest are the freshest. Stale or addled eggs always float on the surface. Upon breaking an egg if the white and yolk are not clearly defined and separated, no matter how carefully the shell has been broken, the egg is not good and should be discarded, for eggs the least bit off color will spoil good cooking.

Topeka, Kan.—One of the last acts of the house was the killing of an item in the general appropriation bill of \$6,000 providing for the erection in the hall of fame at Washington of a statue of John Brown of Ossawatimie. A dramatic scene preceded the demise of the appropriation.
