Mr. Glimkintog Sees Great Possibility in the Scheme of Building Things Over.

### Liquor Selling

Alma Hales was convicted Friday of selling intoxicating liquors to Fred Boshard and Chester Coltrin on the 30th day of January of this year. The trial was before Frost who gave the defendant a sentence of sixty days in the city jail and a fine of \$275.00.

The witnesses in the case were Fred Boshard and Chester Coltrin, and both testified that on the 30th day of January they went to the place known as "The Dry Drug," and asked for drinks. These were served a number of times, and they then asked Hales to sell them a bottle of whiskey, which he did, and they then left. Immediately upon leaving the place they went to Marshal Martell and turned over the bottle, which was used as evidence against the defendant. The defendants offered no testimony as they intend to appeal the case to the district court and fight the matter out there.
