## Presbyterian Church Data

The 122nd general assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, which met in Atlantic City, New Jersey, May 19th to 28th have just made public the reports of that body for the year ending March 31, 1910. These show that there are now 10,011 Presbyterian churches in the United States with a membership of 1,339,000 communicants and 9,073 ministers and a Sabbath School membership of 1,211,527. For the year's work at home and abroad \$2,958,968 was expended. The reports of the various boards of the church, show precisely where this money comes from and where it goes to. In addition to the 9,073 ministers in the United States, the church has under its care 1,866 men who are either preparing to enter its ministry or are working in the missionary field. Services at the local Presbyterian church each Sabbath morning as follows: Sabbath School 10 a. m. Preaching service 11 a. m. and 8 p. m. to which you are cordially invited.
