REPUBLICANS HAVE RALLY

The Republicans held a rally at the city pavilion Wednesday night, which was largely attended. Mrs. Thomas, president of the Ladies Republican Club, conducted the program. Mr. Jones made a short speech at the opening. Mrs. James of Salt Lake City sang a song, "The Boys of the Old Brigade," with an accompaniment on the piano. Jacob Evans of Provo was the first speaker. He went at once to his subject, Prohibition is the Live Wire of the campaign, then he made a comparison between state-wide prohibition as set forth in the Democratic platform and local option as was advocated by the Republicans. He said prohibition could not be enforced against the will of the majority of the people. With local option the people had the right to regulate their own affairs. Music was given by the mandolin which was very fine. The next speaker was W. L. Thomas, Pleasant Grove. He made only a few remarks and pledged if elected to support Hon. George Sutherland for U. S. Senator. He was followed by song by John James "The Village Blacksmith" and was encored. The third and last speaker was Hon. Arthur L. Thomas, post master of Salt Lake City. He spoke for a short time on the tariff, showing what a protective tariff had done for the country, after which he took up the subject of prohibition, naming state after state, which had tried state-wide prohibition advocated by the Democrats of Utah at the present time. Nearly all the states that tried it got tired of it sooner or later; he gave day and date when the different states made and repealed their prohibition laws. Mr. Jones sang "Annie Laurie" at the close. Increased Demand for Machine Guns. 
