700 or 800 pouches containing Christmas mail for Chicago and points west were burned at Peekskill New York Sunday. The mail sacks were in a storage car which carried no mail clerks. The fire was not discovered in time to save but fifteen or twenty sacks from the car.

The cold weather has had a very beneficial effect upon the roads, and as a result the people from the country are coming to town to do their Christmas trading. The merchants are praying that the cold snap will continue all winter if trade will continue as good as it has been the last few days.

From the noise that was made down at the sugar factory late Sunday night, a good many people supposed the boiler had exploded or the factory was on fire, or that half of the employers had been caught in the crusher. Porto Rico is making advancement in matter of education. The enrollment during the last school year reached 61,863 pupils with 923 teachers. This was an increase of 10 per cent in enrollment and 20 per cent of teachers over last year. The free school system is being introduced gradually. An American free public school now exists in every municipality on the island.

It is claimed that a deal has been made between Senator Clark and the O. S. L. Ry. Co. by which the senator purchases all of the O. S. L. lines south of Salt Lake City. This will give the San Pedro road 400 miles of road in Utah, which will prove of great value to it when the California part of the line is completed. This arrangement will likely prevent the Rio Grande's building an independent line to the coast as they will be able to make traffic arrangements with Clark that they couldnot have made with the O. S. L. company. It looks now like next year would be a banner year for railroad building in Utah.

Marconi, the wireless telegraph man, made a successful experiment Sunday, in sending several messages across the ocean from Glace Bay New Foundland to Cornwall England, a distance of 2,300 miles. Now that long distance telegraphing has been demonstrated to be practicable we need not be surprised to see the system take the place of the expensive cable system now in vogue. The trifling comparative cost of the Marconi system should have the effect of bringing all parts of the earth in close communication. Ships at sea can be kept in constant touch with land and with other ships and in case of accident or disaster can appeal for aid. When Peary makes his next dash for the Pole he can carry along a Marconi outfit and every day the world can be advised of his progress. Marconi has certainly given the world a wonderful invention, one that may mean much for the progress of the human family.
