The owners of all such animals would do well to remember there is a pound law and if their neighbors put animals in it for trespassing, nobody will be to blame except those whose duty it is to care for their animals.

The County Court has appropriated \$150 to be applied on the county road west of Hyde Park in gravel hauling, for the improvement of the road, the enterprising citizens there agreeing to duplicate said amount in similar work. It appears to us that this is a good thing for both the county and people, for in every settlement at this season of the year there are idle men and teams, whose labor could be utilized. If only small wages are earned, that is better than none at all. Why don't other precincts do likewise?
