#### Gold in Cache.

#### Ogden Man Comes to Cache, and There Sees Things.

That the particular brand of tamarack, tanglefoot, or bug-juice that has been in common use in the Ogden Standard office for years has been changed for the worse is evident in the following, which appeared in that publication last Friday. The Standard says:

"C. H. Greenwell was in Cache Valley last week. He bought some ducks from a farmer in College ward and in dressing one of them found a small nugget of gold in the gizzard. Mr. Greenwell submitted the specimen to W. L. Buswell, and after testing, it was found to be of superior fineness of gold. Where the duck got the precious metal is a subject for future investigation."

Well, it is somewhat of a question where that duck got its craw full of gold; but there is a strong suspicion here that Greenwell, Buswell and Bill's reporter got a diluted sample of the brand that is on top at nine different places in this city. Here, men sometimes see pink dogs with blue tails and black horses that are white, and if they should happen to get on a duck strain it would be entirely possible for them to find diamonds in the craw, gizzard and on each toe. When Greenwell was in this county he must have struck some of the local mixture.

Later—Advices from College ward are to the effect that the farmers of that city are in the habit of feeding Gold Coin wheat at least three times a day, and it is entirely possible that the accumulation of the precious in the duck's gizzard may be attributed to this.


