Zalmona.

The full production of the great historical play, "Zalmona," exactly as given at the Salt Lake theater will be the bill at the Thatcher Opera House on March 3rd, 1911. There will be about 75 people in the cast, including the members of the choruses and ballet and an orchestra of 10 pieces will be under the direction of Prof. J. J. McClellan, organist of the Salt Lake tabernacle. All the scenery and costumes used in the original production will be seen here and the presentation will be just as the Salt Lake public saw it.

"Zalmona" is a great historical religious drama, based on a most interesting narrative in the Book of Mormon, that of the struggle for a throne in the ancient days on this continent and with a people whose prophets had long before advised them against setting up kings. The setting is among the Jaredites, of whom Joseph Smith said, "A mightier nation never lived on the earth." Ezra C. Robinson has spent thirteen years in writing the play and has been a careful student of the manners and customs of these ancient days according to the best authorities. He has produced a work which according to competent critics is not only a masterpiece, but teaches an interesting portion of history in a manner not to be easily forgotten and conveys a useful lesson.

Akish, the leading character in the play, is the head of the secret orders which come down from the time of the tower of Babel, flourish after arrival on the new continent. For his own purposes he foments strife in the land of Heth, Jared, who usurped the throne of his father, Omer, has been deposed by his more loyal brothers and uses the fascinations of his daughter Zalmona, to win, as he believed, Akish to his side. Akish assists Jared to regain the throne but later with the help of his secret order takes it for himself. He is finally slain by the brother of a woman whom he had cruelly wronged.

There is a splendid love story running through the play and some tender passages between the Princess Angeline, daughter of Omer and the latter's scribe Shemlon. Dissolute courtiers of the court furnish much comedy and one of these is extremely funny in his love making to Angeline's maid. The sad fate of Erma, who has loved Akish too well and is later avenged by her brother is as touching and pathetic as the courtiers are funny.

The play is not a somber one though it deals to some extent with bloody and troublesome times in the Kingdom of Heth. The story is told in pleasing verse and has been given a musical setting by Prof. McClellan who has introduced several grand chorus numbers besides music incidental to the theme of the play. A ballet is one of the features of a grand semi-barbaric feast which is on a scale of magnificence. Besides the feast, there is a splendid throne room

scene and others amid the gardens and palaces of the ancient peoples which are pictured with great effect. Only the choruses and ballet are Utahns, the cast being made up of competent professionals brought on from New York and San Francisco for the production. Miss Etta Delmas, a very beautiful woman and clever actress plays the title role and Emmet O'Reilly, an actor well known in the east, the part of Akish. One Utah girl is in the cast, Miss Blanche Kendall, who has had an enviable stage career, having played in the companies of our Henry Irving, Richard Mansfield and J. H. Stoddard. All the other members of the presenting company are actors of reputation.

The author, Ezra C. Robinson, is a Salt Lake attorney, who began the writing of the play years ago when at college. During five years he spent in the mission field he took every opportunity to familiarize himself with the best authorities on the ancient history of the continent and it is the opinion of every person who has read the play that he has produced a masterpiece.

George L. Graves, a director and producer of merit and reputation has had general charge of the production and will be here with the company. Mr. Graves, who is from New York, has made many productions, but is of the opinion that he has not before been connected with any more meritorious. "Zalmona" will be presented again tonight and tomorrow night.

DISAPPEARANCE OF PHYSICIAN SOLVED

New York, Feb. 27.—The death of a man who was found unconscious in a street of Newark, N. J., yesterday may explain the disappearance of Dr. John Gaynor, a wealthy Brooklyn physician, who dropped out of sight nearly five years ago, taking with him his three small sons and leaving in the hands of caretakers valuable pieces of real estate.

The man, who apparently was suffering from a scalp wound, was taken to the city hospital, where he regained consciousness. He told the attendants that he was Dr. John Gaynor, formerly of Brooklyn, a physician and nephew of Mayor Gaynor. His injuries were regarded at first as slight, but he died within a few hours.
