## THE BIG OPENING PROGRAM AT B. Y. C.

Opening Promises] to be a Most Auspicious One—Excellent Program at Which President Joseph F. Smith And President Anthon H. Lund Will Take Part—Public Cordially Invited.

At the close of last year the general Church Board of Education not only increased the appropriation for the Brigham Young College, but also granted it two years of normal work of college grade. This makes the work of this popular school two fold. In the first place it furnishes a dozen high school courses unexcelled in the west, and in the second place it maintains a standard two-year college normal course equal to any in the state, and the only one in the north.

The college folks are entering their new and distinctive field of labor with vim. On last Sunday evening, Presidents Ballif, Quinney, Linford and Jensen, and Professors Skidmore, Kemp and Norton addressed sympathetic audiences in behalf of the college. The various committees of the faculty already have a large part of their work for the opening under way. The graduation committee has already looked over the credits of a large percentage of the students of the class of 1912, who have expressed their intention to return to graduate next June. Besides these several members of the graduating class of last year are coming back. So all in all the prospects look fine.

Furthermore, the faculty will not let an excellent opportunity to celebrate its new opening pass by. On Sept. 19th, as you will see from the program below, they have arranged for a big day in the history of this institution. At the annual reception to students and patrons, there is a place provided for a formal opening of the new normal school. The public is cordially invited to attend the exercises in the morning and the afternoon, and the students, their parents and invited guests will be present in the evening.

President Joseph F. Smith and President Anthon H. Lund will be in attendance.

## Philadelphia Mayoralty Contest Splits [Hitherto] Model Machine Organization

Vare are candidates for the Republican mayoralty nomination to be determined at the primary on Sept. 30. Vare, whose brother Ed is a millionaire contractor who has had many city contracts, is at present recorder of deeds and has made a creditable record in that office. His chief supporter is Mayor Rebyburn. Earle is backed by United States Senator Boies Penrose and State Senator Jim McNichol, boss of the organization. Earle is a financier who gained a national reputation in a controversy with ex-President Roosevelt over the sugar trust. An illuminating campaign is being waged.

### CONFERENCE AT PRESTON

Quarterly Conference of Oneida Stake Held Here Saturday and Sunday.—Many People are in Attendance.

Preston, Ida, Sept. 10.—The regular quarterly conference of the Oneida Stake of Zion convened in the stake house at Preston on Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 9th and 10th, with President Joseph S. Geddes presiding, assisted by Counselor James Johnson and Taylor Nelson. On the stand besides the stake presidency were Elders George Albert Smith, who attended all sessions and Charles W. Penrose, who attended three sessions of the conference, of the Twelve Apostles. A particular feature of the conference was the spirit of testimony bearing. Mrs. Adeline Knight Belnap of Ogden, daughter of Vincent Knight, 89 years in the church, Father Winward of Whitney, 81 years old, and Father S. H. Hale of Preston, all bore testimony of the fulfillment of prophecies made by the prophet Joseph Smith. This with inspired addresses of the visiting brethren constituted food for thought, especially the address of Elder Penrose on "What we are, who we are, when came we, and where are we going." John Larson was advanced from an alternate to a regular member of the high council and Julius C. Jensen was appointed an alternate.

A pleasing feature of the conference was the beautiful singing of the stake choir under the able leadership of Prof. C. J. Engar. The vocal solos by Mae Nelson and M. W. McNell were much appreciated. Bishop C. W. Nibley was in Logan Sunday.

## AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE OPENS NEXT TUESDAY

The Faculty of the College Are Arriving and Everything is in Readiness for The Winter's Work—Work on the New Smart Gymnasium Progressing Favorably

Members of the faculty of the Agricultural College are arriving for the winter's work from various parts of the country where they have been spending the vacation. Dr. F. L. West of the University of Chicago, arrived in town Sunday and is at present busily engaged in acquainting himself with the new laboratory of physics which is being equipped at the college. Dr. West has spent the summer at the University of Chicago, coming directly from that place to Logan. His work will be rather strenuous for the first few weeks due to the fact that the Department of Physics is being completely made over and readjusted to the needs of the college. A valuable lot of equipment has just arrived for this department and is now being installed. The list of courses to be given in the department have been enlarged this year to include work in six branches. Emphasis is placed upon the work in agricultural physics and household physics to be given to the agricultural and home economic students.

Miss Elizabeth Smith, the librarian, has returned from her vacation which was spent in California at her home in Pasadena. She is busy with her assistants getting the library into shape for the opening on September 19th. Many valuable additions have been made during the summer to the library, especially along the lines of recent scientific publications.

President Widtsoe made a hurried trip to Southern Idaho to deliver a lecture Sunday morning. He drove from Preston to Thatcher, Idaho, last Saturday night, returning to Logan the next day.

Work is progressing rapidly on the Smart Gymnasium. The foreman has a squad of over twenty men at work on the foundation. The prospects are that the work will be done much ahead of the time limit allowed.
