CALL FOR RE-PUBLICAN COUNTY CONVENTION

Logan, Utah, Sept. 25, 1914. The Republican County Convention is hereby called to meet in the county court house at Logan, Cache County, Utah, on the 10th day of October 1914, at 11 o'clock a. m. for the purpose of nominating one State Senator from the Second Senatorial District of the State of Utah; three Representatives to the Utah State Legislature; one County Commissioner for the term of four years; one County Commissioner for the term of two years; one County Clerk; one County Treasurer; one County Sheriff; one County Assessor; one County Recorder; one County Attorney and one County Surveyor. Also to elect a County Chairman to serve for the next two years, and to transact such other business as may properly come before the convention. The precinct primaries to elect delegates to the above named convention are to be held on the 8th day of October, 1914, in the different precincts. The delegates to said convention are based upon one delegate for every twenty votes cast for the Honorable Joseph Howell for Congress in the election of 1912, and will consist of one hundred and forty-four delegates apportioned to the respective precincts of Cache County as follows:

DEADLY EFFECT OF TURPENTINE

London, Oct. 5.—Telegraphing from Paris, the correspondent of Reuters Telegram company, says: "That the fumes of the famous French three inch shell have a most deadly effect in an enclosed space is shown by a scene that met the eyes of the French penetrating a chateau occupied by the Germans and which they had just bombarded. Entering the drawing room they found a company of Wurtembergians petrified in action.

"Some were at the windows taking aim with their fingers still pressing the trigger while others were at the tables where they had been playing games with cards in their hands while still others had cigarettes in their lips. An officer stood with his mouth open as if in the act of dictating a order and all the corpses looked absolutely lifelike."
