### Austrian Charge Now Plays Role of German Ambassador

Baron Zwiedinek Attempting Negotiations for Adjustment of the Ancona Controversy

Washington, Dec. 21.—Pending receipt of Austria Hungary's reply to the second American note regarding the sinking of the Italian steamship Ancona, Baron Erich Zwiedinek, in charge of the Austro Hungarian embassy, is conducting or forming a basis to conduct informal negotiations with Secretary Lansing looking toward an amicable settlement of the controversy. An intimation that effect was received at the state department today after the charge had conferred at some length with the secretary.

It is understood Baron Zwiedinek is attempting negotiations similar to those conducted by Count von Bernstorff, the German ambassador, following the sinking of the steamship Arabic. It is considered improbable, however, that such negotiations can develop to an important stage until after receipt of the next formal communication from Austria Hungary, which is expected some time within a week.

Just what authority Baron Zwiedinek has been given by his government is not known. It was recalled today that the relations between the United States and Germany were seriously strained when the German ambassador was given virtually a free hand to conduct the negotiations. In some official quarters the belief prevails that it was the negotiations conducted by Count von Bernstorff which prevented the situation from becoming more serious than it at one time admittedly was.

Baron Zwiedinek now is virtually in the same position as the German ambassador then found himself. It is considered that with a knowledge of American views and the advantage of personal contact with United States officials the baron might be able to accomplish more than could result from exchange of diplomatic communications. The charge is known to have had word of some sort from his home government. It is also known that his attention was called to the reply which was made to the first American note.

resenting the limit of flexibility of the system, quadruple duplex operation is made possible. By this it is meant that four channels in each direction are provided on a single line. While greater speed is easily attained 45 words a minute is the average rate of transmission used, which means that 180 words may be sent in each direction over a wire in one minute, or a total of 360.  
The instruments included in the new equipment are described and fully illustrated in the January Popular Mechanics Magazine.

### Income Tax to Be Laid in Germany

Secretary of Treasury Tells Reichstag Next Budget Must Provide Additional Income

Berlin, Dec. 21.—The reichstag today passed the second and third readings of the war credit of 10,000,000,000 marks which the government had requested. Only nineteen socialists voted in the negative.

Before the vote was taken Friedrich August Karl Geyer read a brief statement on behalf of the socialist minority explaining their negative vote while Friedrich Ebert the socialist leader, spoke in behalf of the socialist majority, and announced amid loud applause that his wing of the party would vote "Yes."

The discussion was opened by Dr. Karl Hefferich secretary of the imperial treasury, who announced that the next budget could not be balanced without additional income and that proposals for income taxations were being drafted for submission to the reichstag.

Dr. Eduard David, socialist leader, criticized the financial policy hitherto followed during the war of financing war expenditures through loans, and demanded new taxation. He suggested taking over armament industries and mines as government monopolies for the purpose of additional revenue.

Dr. Hefferich replying to Dr. David denied that the government had adopted the loan method of financing the war as a definite principle. He said that German financial experts were convinced from the beginning that the so called British system of financing the war by immediate taxation could not succeed but that this did not mean that the taxation screw should not be tightened during the war.

### House to Leave on Mission for Wilson

Confidential Adviser of President is Going to Europe to See Ambassadors

New York, Dec. 21.—Colonel E. M. House confidential adviser of President Wilson, stated late today that he will shortly sail for Europe at the request of the president.

Colonel House declared that the sole purpose of his trip would be to deliver to certain American ambassadors information regarding this government's attitude on various international matters now pending. He denied emphatically that his trip in any way be a peace mission.

Colonel House said he expected to sail from here within the next two weeks and probably would be in Europe about six or eight weeks.

"I am going to Europe at the request of the president and secretary of state for the purpose of taking information to some of our ambassadors, he said, "in order that they may have a more intimate knowledge of this government's attitude regard-

ing certain phases of international questions and in order to obtain from them their point of view on these matters.

"It is not advisable to bring home at this time any of our ambassadors from the belligerent countries. It has been found impossible to convey or obtain by cable or correspondence quite the correct atmosphere."

Secretary Lansing tonight declined to add anything to the announcement by Colonel House that he was going to Europe at the request of the president and secretary of state.

From other official sources, however, came the intimation that the international questions which Colonel House is to take up with American ambassadors of the capitals of belligerent powers were of such an extremely delicate nature that they could not be discussed. It was suggested that Colonel House's statement should be taken at its face value, and questions as to whether he would make informal inquiries concerning the prospects of peace elicited no response.
