The different committees who had charge of the celebration are certainly to be congratulated on the way that everything was carried out. There was something doing every minute of the day and all went away well pleased with the celebration.

In the forenoon a parade was held showing the progress of 1916 over 1850 when the pioneers first settled the town. About twenty of the old pioneers were riding in automobiles in the parade and many beautiful decorated machines were in the procession.

At 11 o'clock the people gathered at the meeting house where a program was held. Music was furnished by the Imperial Male Quartet of Salt Lake City and after the address of welcome by Mayor A. B. FIND BODY OF DROWNED MAN AT HYRUM

Feet Caught in Brush and Held Fast For Nearly Two Months. Funeral Probably Today

The body of Emil Olsen of Hyrum was found on Thursday in the waters of the Little Bear River about a mile down stream from where the unfortunate man fell into it, a little over seven weeks ago. A searching party was out all day making the search and about 2 o'clock while the other members of the party were to luncheon, Arthur Thompson and John Jorgenson came upon the body under a clump of bushes. There was about three feet of water at the point where the body was discovered.

The body was held together by the clothes. It was in such a shape that it could not have been recognized, had it not been known that it was Mr. Olsen whom they were searching for. The overalls which he had on were in perfect condition, the other wearing apparel, however, was somewhat torn supposed to have been done as the body was rushed down stream by the searing torrents and catching onto snags. The feet were snagged in the bushes and held there firmly.

Funeral services will probably be held today, Saturday, June 17, in the First ward meeting house.
