

THE DAIRY COW

Dairying the last few years has assumed somewhat large proportions in Cache County. Our condenseries and creameries pay for milk and butterfat approximately two million dollars annually. Add to this the amount of milk and cream consumed at home and that which is fed to calves together with the cream that is shipped out of the county by various farmers and we can readily appreciate the fact that the industry is by no means small.

But to the casual observer who sees our wonderful possibilities in dairy lines, our growth, while steady seems slow. We have a few excellent pure bred dairy herds in the county and a number of very good grade herds. But we still see too many cows of inferior quality being used for dairy purposes and the majority of the bulls which head our dairy herds don't speak well for the dairy knowledge of their owners. But as a whole prospects look very encouraging and much improvement will undoubtedly be made within the next few years.

Cache county is especially well adapted to dairy farming. We have an ideal climate, pure mountain water and an abundance of good nutritious foods. Our alfalfa is second to none. It has been proven beyond a doubt that we can grow as heavy a tonnage and as good a quality of corn for silage as can be grown anywhere. We grow thousands of acres of beets and are learning that the tops can be preserved and that they make a feed of high value for dairy stock.

We have four sugar factories in the county from which the farmers can secure an abundance of pulp and which makes a very good feed if properly fed. Our grain feeds are of the best and can be secured as cheap as anywhere else. In the writers opinion all we need to make

the dairy industry the biggest and most important industry in the county and the county one of the richest agriculture spots in the world is "the man behind the cow." We have as high an order of intelligence among our farming population here as you will find anywhere. But we have not as yet given the dairy cow the study that she deserves. We do not read enough dairy literature and as dairymen take too little pride in our profession.

We must learn that we are breeding dairy cattle both as a means of a livelihood and as a profession that our herd sire is half the herd and that our future prosperity and reputation depends largely upon his get. We must learn that if we are to succeed we must raise cows of which we can be proud and learn to keep them in such condition that the appearance of our animals justifies our pride. We must learn that we owe it to the community in which we live to raise the standard of our profession in that community. We must learn that to leave our dairy animals out in a severe snow storm is unprofitable, and that not to feed right is bad business.

We have a number of men in the county that have learned these and many more important things about dairy farming. We have many others that have not as yet learned the first principle of this important industry. The encouraging signs are the young men of ability and education taking hold of the work with a vim and enthusiasm that can not help but bring success.
