CONCERNING THE WAR MOTHERS CONVENTION

In the interest of the local branches of Cache county's War Mothers association, there being many of the sisters who did not see the report of the proceedings published in last Sunday's issue of the Salt Lake dailies, we have obtained the following report from the Cache delegation, which attended the convention, consisting of the President, Mrs. C. L. Trotman, the Recording Secretary, Mrs. George Q. Rich and the Comptress, Mrs. E. R. Owen.

There were but four counties represented outside of Salt Lake county, the same being Weber, Utah, Summit and Cache, but a good attendance was had in point of numbers, all the state officers being present. The Convention was held at the Hotel Utah, November 8, at 2 p. m. and lasted several hours and the following business was transacted.

All of the War Mothers association of the state, and Weber county's organization, known as the Women Patriots of America, were merged into a new organization, under the name of The Service Star Legion, and a new constitution therefor was adopted, the purpose being to form the Utah chapter of the national organization of that name, so as to work in harmony with the national organization and also more in harmony with the warrior's organization known as the American Legion.

New state officers of the re-born association were elected as follows: President, Mrs. W. O. Jennings, S. Lake City; vice president, Mrs. Harry Fletcher, Provo; corresponding secretary, Mrs. Louise Holt, Salt Lake City; Recording secretary, Mrs. J. E. Colter, Lehi; treasurer, Mrs. John D. Spencer, Salt Lake City; historian, Mrs. Amy Lyman Merrill, Logan; state organizer, Mrs. J. G. Flack, Ogden; executive committee, Mrs. Annie Wells Cannon, Salt Lake City; Mrs. Edward Blischel, Ogden; Mrs. W. P. Jennings, Salt Lake City; Mrs. J. G. Hanchett and Mrs. Sol Selgel, Salt Lake City.

It will be noticed that Cache county was awarded the office of historian in the new organization which is probably the most responsible position attached to the new organization. In this connection it is to be noted that two names were submitted by President Trotman of the nominating committee. In position with no choice between the two and as Mrs. Merrill is not sure that her other duties, which are arduous will permit of her acceptance the other nominee may be installed.

Such reorganization as may be rendered necessary by the changed condition affected by this merger of the old War Mothers association throughout the state will be affected by the state organization in proper time.

Our Cache delegation speak very highly of the very cordial manner in which they were received and entertained at the capital by the officers of the state organization and visiting delegations and came home feeling that a vast field of usefulness lies before them.

Concluding, we congratulate the several officers of Cache county's War Mothers' association for their past work. They have been live wires and we bespeak for them our aid in their future work and success along the lines of their new undertaking.

of the discussion at the National Convention of Commercial club secretaries held at Indianapolis, October 27 to 29th, the secretary recommended that the following changes and improvements be adopted. That the name Chamber of Commerce be adopted. Over ninety per cent of the commercial organizations throughout the country have adopted the name Chamber of Commerce. That a program of work for the club be outlined for the year and that special committees appointed to see that each part is carried out in due season. This gives a plan of work and an opportunity to work a plan, and the haphazard work is done away. The budget system, getting out new advertising material, more attention to securing new members and membership conservation, closer personal touch with the members through bulletins, circular letters, meetings, referendums, etc., community advertising and other things were also recommended.

At the convention the best thought and exhibits of the entire country were given. Over forty three sales were represented and the local organization should adopt some new changes in methods in order to be more up-to-date and efficient. The first requisite for any efficient organization is a good working budget and it is hoped the Ways and Means committee will provide one.

In order for more of the club members to attend important church meetings on Wednesday evenings and to avoid conflicts the board decided to hold its monthly meetings on Thursday evenings instead of Wednesday evenings. At the next meeting of the club the members will be asked to consider a similar change in dates.

At the meeting Mr. Olof Nelson reported that the road north of the city was being placed in good condition as quickly as possible. Mr. Nelson of course is in no way responsible for the condition of this road but has shown much public spirit in helping the bad situation out with his equipment.
