ing, quality and good appearance are demanded, as even animals of registered breeding may lack some point of development, which fact bars them from exhibition. Such animals will be disqualified and removed from the buildings and exhibitors are requested to use judgment and care in entering their stock. Judges are instructed to award prizes according to the way they themselves would select animals for breeding purposes, and the rigid rules regarding their selections makes collusion or fraud in the awards practically impossible.

In addition to the handsome prizes offered by the committee in charge of arrangements several special prizes have been offered by private citizens.

The Ogden Union Stockyards where the big show will be held have excellent facilities for such an exhibit. Men of international prominence are to be selected as judges of the show and any disputes will be adjudicated by a special committee. The show will be conducted along the established lines for such exhibits. On the whole it promises to be a highly important event for western livestock interests.

FUEL OIL DISPLACING COAL

Several millions tons of coal have been displaced by fuel oil in New England out of total annual coal requirements of 60,000 tons in that section. This displacement of coal refers only to industrial users and does not include domestic consumers, such as hotels and office buildings. The Mexican Petroleum company is selling 500,000 barrels of oil yearly for domestic purposes and this alone has displaced half of the several million tons of coal used in manufacturing enterprises in New England.

Present situation regarding coal is the biggest stimulus to the use of oil ever experienced. Hundreds of manufacturing and public utility establishments in the Atlantic states are installing oil as fuel instead of coal. The rising price of coal, because of higher price of production is certain to accelerate the increased use of oil.
