NOTICE TO CITY WATER USERS

SCHEDULE FOR USE OF CITY WATER FOR SPRINKLING LAWNS OR 1921

Beginning June 1st and until further notice the following water schedule will be in effect. East Side of Main Street.—Daily, from 6 a. m. to 12 a. m. West Side of Main Street.—Daily, from 3 p. m. to 9 p. m. All automatic sprinklers from 7 o 7:30 a. m. daily.

The following schedule will apply to the various size lawns: All lawns having 100 square yards and less will be allowed 1 hour for sprinkling daily. Lawns over 100 square yards and less than 200, 2 hours daily. Lawns over 200 square yards and less than 300, 3 hours daily. Lawns over 300 square yards and less than 400, 4 hours daily. Lawns over 400 square yards and less than 500, 5 hours daily. Lawns over 500 square yards and less than 600, 6 hours daily. All lawns over 600 square yards by special arrangement with water master.

Not more than one line of hose will be allowed on any lawn except by special permission. All lawns east of Main street to commence sprinkling at 6 a. m. All lawns west of Main street to commence sprinkling at 3 p. m. Water for sprinkling must be run through a quarter-inch nozzle. Sprinkling gardens prohibited except by special permission of the city water master. All leaky taps and hydrants must be repaired at once to prevent waste of water. In order to maintain this schedule it must be strictly lived up to. The water will be turned off the premises of all violators and a cash penalty imposed.

TO ALL PERSONS INTERESTED: Notice is hereby given that the petition of E. A. Parsons and others praying for the organization of a drainage district, to be known as and named as the Cache County Drainage District No. 2, in Cache County, State of Utah, was presented to the Board of County Commissioners of Cache County, State of Utah, on the 18th day of April, A. D. 1921, and was filed with the County Clerk of said Cache County in the courthouse building, in Cache County, State of Utah at Logan City, on the 18th day of April A. D. 1921, and said petition is now on file in the office of the said County Clerk.

The boundaries of the land proposed to be included in said proposed Drainage District are described as follows:—to-wit: Beginning at a point, at the southwest corner of Sec. 18, Township 12 North, Range 1 East, Salt Lake Base and Meridian thence east three and one half miles to the south quarter corner of Section 15, thence north two miles, thence west one-fourth mile, thence north one mile, thence west one-fourth mile to the northwest corner of Section 3, thence south one-fourth mile, thence west one-fourth mile, thence south one-fourth mile, thence west one-fourth mile, thence north one-fourth mile, thence west one-half mile to the northwest corner of Section 31, Township 12 North, Range 1 East, Salt Lake Base and Meridian, thence south one mile, thence east one half mile, thence south three-fourths mile, thence west one-half mile, thence south three-fourths mile thence west one mile, thence east one-half mile, thence south one-half mile, thence east one-half mile, thence south one-half mile to the point of beginning, enclosing an area of approximately 6840 acres; and a more particular description of the lands proposed to be included within the boundaries of the proposed drainage district is as follows: TOWNSHIP 12 NORTH, RANGE 1 EAST, SALT LAKE BASE AND MERIDIAN. The starting points, routes and termini and general description of the proposed drainage systems are as follows: DRAIN A—Beginning at a point in the Bear River near the northwest corner of Section 31, Township 12 North, Range 1 East, Salt Lake Base and Meridian, extending in a general southeasterly direction and terminating near the south boundary of Section 31. DRAIN B—Beginning at a point in Hopkins Slough near the northwest corner of Section 7, Township 12 North, Range 1 East, Salt Lake Base and Meridian, extending in a southeasterly direction to a point near the center of Section 7, thence east to a point near the center of Section 8, thence northeasterly to a point near the southwest corner of the northwest quarter of the northeast quarter of Section 8, thence east to the west line of Section 10, Township 12 North, Range 1 East of the Salt Lake Base and Meridian. DRAIN C—Beginning at a point in the Big Slough near the southwest corner of Section 18, Township 12 North, Range 1 East of the Salt Lake Base and Meridian, extending in a northeasterly direction and terminating at a point near the north quarter corner of Section 18.
