

State News.

Patriarch William Mendenhall died this week in Springville at the advanced age of 91.

Mrs. Susanna Talmage, mother of Dr. James E. Talmage of the state university, died at her home in Provo last Sunday of heart trouble.

Dr. Joseph F. Merrill delivered the baccalaureate address to the 43 college graduates and the 107 normal graduates of the State University.

A summer school course in theology will be given at the Latter-day Saints University this summer to which all church school teachers of the Mormon church taking summer school work in Salt Lake will be expected to attend.

Gov. Cutler has issued a proclamation urging the citizens of the state to observe the 129th anniversary of the Stars and Stripes by displaying the flag on their business houses and homes and by holding exercises appropriate for the occasion.

A severe electrical storm struck American Fork Saturday, causing a great deal of damage and terror in the town. A number of cattle were killed by lightning, while many people were stunned and narrowly escaped death from the same cause.

David Jenkins, an Ogden young man, has undergone an operation for trepanning of the skull, in the hope of his restoration to sanity. The patient was kicked on the head by a horse several years ago, and has since been subject to spells of insanity. Strong hopes for his recovery are entertained.

Those of our readers who have relatives and friends in foreign countries, and most of us have, will be pleased to know that a reclassification of mail to foreign countries has been established whereby articles may be sent to these countries at the rate of twelve cents per pound. The weight of the package must not exceed four pounds or the value fifty dollars. It has formerly cost \$1.60 to mail a four-pound package which we can now send for forty-eight cents. Exchange.

The question of the consolidation of the Agricultural college at Logan and the State University is going to bring on a bitter fight, in which the friends of the A. C. will contend to the limit of their energy to maintain the present independent standing of their school. A majority report from the committee on consolidation is ready, and favors the uniting of the two colleges under one management. It will be submitted at the next session of the legislature, and Gov. Cutler will advise its adoption. The A. C. supporters are preparing for a hard fight, and threaten that if not successful in the legislature, they will carry the matter directly to the voters in all parts of the state.

CARE OF FURNITURE.

Keep New Pieces as Long as Possible Without Restoratives.

New furniture should be kept as long as possible without the use of restoratives. Furniture which has been finished with shellac or varnish, whether in glossy or dull finish, should never be cleaned with soap and water. Soap is made to cut oily substances and thus eats out the oil from the waxed, oiled or shellacked surface and works destruction. If an oil restorer seems a necessity, raw linseed oil and raw turpentine in equal parts applied on a piece of cheesecloth will be found most often of service.

For carved portions which require daily attention soft brushes, such as are used for the cleaning of silver, are the best agent. Brush the ornamented portions thoroughly with a dry brush and use a second for the real cleaning. Dip the second in turpentine and use without fear of scratching the surface of the wood.

Where white spots appear on surfaces from the dropping of liquids or from heat the immediate application of raw linseed oil generally restores the color. The oil should be left on the affected spot for several hours or overnight. Alcohol performs the service if applied at once to rosewood or highly finished mahogany. In each instance when the color has returned the spot should be repolished with a piece of cheesecloth moistened with turpentine.

Teachers Attention.

County Examination at St. George, June 7, 8, and 9.

There will be only two county examinations for school teachers this year. The first will be held at St. George, June 7, 8, and 9. The second will be some time in August, perhaps at Virgin or Toquerville. Teachers will be given credit for all subjects successfully pursued in the University Summer school, and will not be required to pass in such subjects. Those desiring their last year's credits may get them by applying to the State Supt. Upon the recommendation of the County Superintendent teachers will be exempt from passing in those subjects in which they reached 75 per cent.

Teachers who do not hold certificates and who desire to teach must secure necessary credits at or prior to the August examination, or they will not be permitted to teach in this state this year.
