Notice of Election.
NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN:

That pursuant to, and in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 74, Laws of Utah, 1909, as amended by Chapter 53, Laws of Utah, 1911, an Irrigation District has been duly proposed for organization in Iron County, State of Utah, which said district has been named the IRON COUNTY IRRIGATION DISTRICT; that orders have been duly and regularly made by the Board of County Commissioners of Iron County, granting the application of the petitioners, asking that such Irrigation District be organized; that a good and sufficient bond has been filed with the County Clerk of Iron County, and approved by the Board of County Commissioners, to secure the payment to Iron County of all costs pertaining to such organization, and that all such orders have been directed to be placed on file and of record in the Office of the County Clerk of said Iron County; that said Irrigation District is divided into three election precincts, to-wit: District No. One shall include all the land within the boundaries of said district lying North-easterly of the quarter corner common to Sections 17 and 16, in Township 26 South, Range 16 West, Salt Lake Meridian; District No. Two shall include all the land embraced in the boundaries of said District lying North-westerly of the quarter corner common to Sections 16 and 17, in Township 36 South, Range 16 West, Salt Lake Meridian; District No. Three shall include all the land embraced within the boundaries of said District lying South of the quarter corner common to Sections 16 and 17, in Township 36 South, Range 16 West, Salt Lake Meridian.

IT IS THEREFORE HEREBY ORDERED, that an election is directed to be held in said above described Election Precincts within the said Irrigation District, on Saturday, the 26th day of August, 1911; that on said day the polls are directed to open at 8 o'clock a. m., and to remain open until 6 o'clock p. m., at which time and places all land owners within said district who are entitled to vote, may have the privilege of voting for or against the organization of the Iron County Irrigation District and for the election of a Board of Directors, three in number, one from each of the three election precincts above specified.

The polling places for the three election precincts within the Iron County Irrigation District, are hereby designated as follows:

polling place for Precinct No. One shall be at the South-west corner of the North-west quarter of Sect on 16, in Township 36 South, Range 16 West, S. L. M.

polling place for Precinct No. 2, shall be at the South-east corner of the North-east quarter of Section 17, Township 36 South, Range 16 West, S. L. M.

polling place for Precinct No. 3 shall be at the North east corner of the South-east quarter of Section 17, Township 36 South, Range 16 West, S. L. Mer.

TRIBUTE TO NERO.

Lucrezia Borgia Was Not All to the Bad.

SQUARE DEAL FOR CYRUS II.

Q. Hope Jones' Fifteen Cent Lecture at Huckleberry Hill Shows That There is a Good Side to All Badness—Historical Blemishes Toned Down.

"MY DEAR FRIENDS—After a hard tramp over the railroad ties of twenty-two miles I have reached Huckleberry Hill and am standing before you and observing that among the nineteen people in the hall eight are dead-ends. That fact will make no difference with my lecture, however, the subject of which is, 'The Good Side of Badness.' Before I have finished I hope to make you feel more tolerant toward certain people whose memories have been jumped on with both feet for several generations past.

"It has cost me much time and money to gather my statistics and see

That is the cost of admission to any hall to see a trained hog, and compared to the performance of a trained hog, my lecture is as corn to the husks. Q. Hope Jones belongs to no trust, and because he has got a good thing he is not going to be selfish about it.

"For hundreds of years, my friends, the name of Nero has been held up to scorn and detestation because he fiddled when Rome was burning and because he had a little way of slaughtering from 5,000 to 10,000 prisoners in a batch to save army rations. Nero also had a trick of wiping out towns and depopulating farming communities, and we have heard of his putting out eyes and shaving off toes and fingers. Historians have gone at it and made out that he was never so happy as when slicing up orphans or sticking old women full of pins.

"We are down on Nero because we have heard but one side of his character. It's just another case of Stand and Oil brought down to date. When Mr. Rockefeller raises the price of kerosene a cent a gallon we are down on him; when he gives \$1,000,000 to beat the hookworm we haven't a word of praise.

The Good That Was In Nero.

"Who was Nero? Has any man or woman in Huckleberry Hill asked the question? No. You have gone right along not caring a darn who or what he was, but ready to believe the worst of him. As a kid Nero was one of the best of the bunch. A little sugar tied up in an old rag contented him. As a youth he was never charged with stealing eggs or stoning the school-house windows. He drew water for the washing, and he mowed the lawn, and he took all the prizes in Sunday school. Industrious, honest and truthful, he was a living example to be pointed out to others. I have been told that Nero and I are alike in this respect.

"Such was the probity of the young man when he reached his majority that you might have searched his rooms from top to bottom without coming across the photo of a chorus girl or a love letter from the cashier of a restaurant. This evidence alone ought to be sufficient to satisfy you as to what sort of a young man he was, but it has always been rigidly suppressed by historians.

"Nero was twenty-three years old when the blow fell—that is, he fell in love with a female trainer of lions. We have all been there. The thing is bound to happen. We have done just as Nero did when the chance came. That yaller haired young man on the back seat will do it. I think Nero would have done better to fall in love with a stenographer, but I'm

not going to criticize. As it turned out, the female trainer was after his cash and didn't care a tunk for him. If that young woman had not toyed with Nero's heart and busted his bank account he would have married happily and been taken on as keeper of the elephant and driver of the band wagon. But she toyed, and when he discovered that she was toying he became a terror on wheels. I have been told that I am like Nero about that. Let a woman toy with my heart and I should become a raging lion. He went in to show things around from that

date on. Rome suffered. The enemy suffered. He had a hankering to wipe things off the face of the earth. He had been thrown down, and thrown hard, and he hadn't the sand to bid his aching heart cease to ache and look around for another mash.

"Let us not be too hard on Nero. Give him a show. Name your boy babies after him. Ask yourselves if you wouldn't have done the same in his place.

Lucrezia Borgia Not All Bad.

"And take notice how history has picked up Lucrezia Borgia and held her up as the monster of that age. History has committed a great wrong. I started out on Lucrezia's trail feeling that hanging was too good for her, but as I traced her career step by step I had to leave prejudice behind. As a child she wouldn't hurt a fly. The sight of a bulldog picking up a cat by the neck would have thrown her into convulsions.

"As a girl Miss Lucrezia was considerate of other people's feelings to a wonderful degree. Had a young man with a pimple on his nose been courting her she would have died before asking him why he didn't have it shaved off. She was a favorite in society. She always sat down on the edge of a chair and folded her hands and replied 'Yes, ma'am,' and 'No, ma'am,' and she knew nothing whatever about flirtation.

"It was only when Miss L. B. has become a young woman and discovered that her relatives were plotting to rob her of her inheritance and send her out to work in a sweatshop at \$4 a week that she turned to poison. She dosed the family right and left, and when she saw what a good thing it was she began to give it to outsiders. You may say it was naughty, but what was the poor girl to do?

"It is pretty well authenticated that the charming Miss Borgia poisoned off fourteen different people before the doctors got on to the trick, but I feel assured that each and every one of the victims ought to have died with consumption if not that way. And, besides, they had large and liberal funeral processions, and the cost of their tombstones was immense.

Square Deal For Cyrus II.

"And let us for a moment take up the case of King Cyrus II. According to history, nothing pleased him more than to fling 600 or 800 people over a precipice or to tie half a thousand innocent children to the tails of wild horses. It is asserted that in one day, with his own hand, he stabbed 250 captives to death, and the very day, to change the program, he buried the same number alive. When Cyrus was in merry mood, as the historians tell us, he lopped off the arms of fifty captives and set them to climbing trees and turning handspindles. If he got up in the morning with a rocky feeling 100 prisoners lost their heads to make him feel better.

"My huckleberry friends of Huckleberry Hill, don't believe all you read about Cyrus. Don't believe half of it. He was a pretty hard case, but there was a good excuse for it. Woman again. Married a girl who pretended to think the world of him and then ran away with a circus bare-back rider. Never even stopped to shut the henhouse door or feed the cat before she went. She just drove that man into being what he was. Every time he lopped off 500 heads he thought of her. Every time he lopped off feet he thought of that bareback rider. You or I would have done the same. Name your boys Nero. If you haven't got any boy babies then name your dogs after him." Give everybody a fair show, including the old uns who have passed away. It will cost nothing and make you feel good. There is ever badness, but there is ever a good side to it."
