ONE of the best known educators of the country is Dr. Edwin A. Alderman, president of the University of Virginia. He is a Virginian by birth, and all his educational career has been in the south. Graduated from the University of North Carolina in 1882, he was unanimously chosen president of his alma mater in 1896 and administered its affairs with marked success for four years. Then he accepted a call to the presidency of Tulane university and in 1904 was elected president of the historic institution at Charlottesville. He is a director of the general education board of the Southern States Education Society, which is extending financial aid to so many institutions of learning throughout the country. Dr. Alderman is an eloquent speaker, with a lively sense of humor.
