ONLY HALF TOLD IT.

From our article of last week, in which reference was made to the large pump well of Wilford Day, the inference might be drawn that Mr. Day had only the one pump well specifically mentioned. As a matter of fact, this is a new well being operated for the first time this season, while his older and smaller plant located three-quarters of a mile farther north, has been working away for three seasons without a serious hitch or accident. This well is equipped with a six h. p. gasoline engine, the water rising to near the surface. His phenomenal success with this well induced him to put down the big well referred to last week, which is down 480 feet, taking in all the important strata of water encountered, and equipped with a 20 h. p. Fairbanks-Morse oil engine, which consumes a very low grade of petroleum, worth in car lots at Lund only about 5 cents per gallon. When arrangements have been made for importing this kind of fuel in car lots, Mr. Day expects to be able to operate his well at a very low cost.

Mr. Day is one of the pioneers in the pumping business of the Parowan valley, and has done a great deal to develop this important industry in that section.

Mail Contractor Buys Hudson Car.

Last Monday Agent S. A. Halterman was negotiating the sale of the new seven-passenger Hudson car that he recently imported, to W. P. Barton, the mail contractor between Paragonah and Cedar City, and Tuesday Mr. Barton drove the handsome car over the route for the first time, showing that the sale had been consummated. Heretofore Mr. Barton has operated the route with success with a Ford touring car, but the steady increase of business has made a larger car necessary. The new Hudson put in service places him in a position to take care of the travel as well as the mail, in first class shape.

The weather has been exceptionally hot and dry for several weeks, and unless the usual July rains come soon farmers will suffer a severe loss to their crops.

For the present Hon. Wilford Day has abandoned the idea of a trip to the coast in his private car, owing to the fact that he failed to interest an agreeable company in the project. However, next Monday, with a car full of people he will leave for Salt Lake City to take in the Wizard of the Wasatch carnival.

COUNTY ASSESSMENT IS A LITTLE LOWER.

Returns Filed With County Clerk Indicate Decrease of \$29,498 From Last Year's Figures.

According to the official returns filed in the county clerk's office, there is a decrease in the total assessment of Iron county for 1915, as compared with the previous year, of 29,498. The total assessed value, according to the assessor's returns, is \$2,783,581 for the current year and \$2,813,079 for 1914. For 1913, the assessed value was \$2,475,205, and the increase, though gradual, has been steady for a number of years.

The reason ascribed by the county clerk for the decrease is a change of officials, it being found that it takes an assessor two or three years to get onto the "ropes" so that he cannot be imposed upon.

Based upon the above assessment for this year and on last year's levies, the people will have about \$110,000 to raise for taxes alone this fall.

National Aeroplane Competition.

To revive popular interest in aviation, stimulate domestic manufacturers and fliers and assist the War and Navy departments in developing aerial corps for the National Guard and Naval Militia, a national aeroplane competition of broad scope is to be held throughout the present summer. The purpose of this undertaking is purely a constructive one. It is not a wholesale amusement propaganda, but a serious attempt to encourage sane flying and impress upon the people of America, the parent country of aviation, the real value of air craft in contrast to the county-fair uses with which they are most familiar.

This aeronautical meet is being promoted by the Aero Club of America, backed by the various state and city clubs, as well as commercial organizations in different parts of the United States. The contest started July 4th and will end on Columbus Day, October 12, giving more than three months of commercial flying in all parts of the country, something hitherto unknown on this continent. Tentative plans and the rules as now drawn are solely in the interest of normal flying by regular airmen. The conditions of the competition are such that no encouragement is given spectacular or foolhardy work, but opportunity afforded for worth-while achievements.—From the July Popular Mechanics Magazine.
