REVENUE LAW IS CONSIDERED

Representatives of Four Counties and State Officers Meet and Discuss New Tax Measure.

As announced in the last issue of The Record, an important convention of county officials and state officers was held in the county court house, Parowan, Utah, last Tuesday, for the purpose of discussing and becoming familiar with the provisions of the new revenue law as passed by the last legislature of Utah.

The counties of Beaver, Garfield, and Piute, were represented, besides the commissioners and practically all the officials of Iron county in any way interested in the gathering of taxes, being present, and the following state officers: President Bailey of the board of equalization, Harding Bennion of the board, Bp. Watson of Ogden, another member of the state board, Mr. Gabbot, ex-assessor of Salt Lake county, State Auditor Kelley.

The provisions of the new revenue law were taken up and discussed in detail, and while the state officers were not absolutely convinced that the new law would be an improvement, they asserted positively that there was no course open but the literal enforcement of the law as it stands. If in actual use it proves defective in any respect, it will be amended or changed as seems necessary.

What Law Provides.

The important features of the new law are that all property will be assessed at its actual cash value, and the tax levies for all purposes are limited to 15 mills, as against 50 to 60 that are levied in some localities under the present law. Property owners will be put on oath by the assessor, and any person refusing to answer in a straight-forward manner the questions of the assessor will be assessed by the county board of equalization high enough to make it an object for such person to answer in future. Persons proven to have misrepresented the amount or value of their property will be handled for perjury. There is no appeal nor redress from the assessment placed on one's property by the county board of equalization, if the property owner has refused or evaded giving correct information in relation to his property. The new law will go into effect on the first of January next, and will be in full operation for the assessment and collection of taxes next year.

If everybody starts out with the determination to give in their property honestly and fully, the burden of taxation will be more evenly distributed than under the present system, and will be no more irksome than at the present time. It is certainly to be hoped that this will be the case.

3 Per Cent Penalty for Delinquency.

Attention was also called to the provision of law operative in the payment of taxes the present year, which provides for a penalty of 3 per cent on the amount of every tax that is allowed to become delinquent, and the abolition of the practice on the part of some treasurers of accepting the promise of some individuals whom they deem "good" in lieu of actual payment prior to the date of publication of the tax list. This practice was strongly condemned by the state officials as being not only unjust, but unsafe as well.

WORK PROGRESSES ON CO-OP STORE BUILDING.

Work is progressing rapidly on the new Co-op. Store building. It is now ready for the roof. The contractor for the Cedar City School building has this in charge also. Within a week the building will be ready for the plumbing. Mr. Hall the plumbing contractor of the Cedar School building has taken this contract. This building has more basement and first floor space than any other store building south of Provo. The construction of the building has been done largely by local workmen, and compares favorably with any work to be found in the County. The structural effect and front appearance is artistic, and will be a pleasing addition to the business section of Parowan.

Bentley-Eyre Wedding.

Miss Lucy Bentley surprised her many friends here by taking a trip to St. George last week and returning as Mrs. Ernest Eyre. On her arrival here several of the young lady's friends gave her a shower. Mr. Eyre has lately returned from a mission to
