

AN ORDINANCE

Creating and Establishing Width of College Avenue in Cedar City Utah.

Be it ordained by the City Council of Cedar City, Utah:

Section 1. That that certain public street in Cedar City, Utah, extending from Main Street west to Third West Street, the center line of which commences at the South East corner of Lot 13, Block 25, Plat B. Cedar City Town Survey and extending West to its intersection with said Third West Street, at the South West cor. of Lot 8, Blk 27 of said survey is hereby designated, and the same shall be known as College Avenue.

Section 2. That the width of said College Avenue is hereby established as being 31.5 feet on each side of the center line thereof, as described in Section 1 of this Ordinance.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after the 11th day of June, A. D. 1920.

PNEUMATIC TRUCK TIRES NEARLY PUNCTURE PROOF

One phase of the use of pneumatic truck tires which has worried the truck owner to no small degree is the possibility of punctures.

"Regarding punctures," says W. V. Logan, manager of the pneumatic truck tire department of the United States Tire Company, "our records show that an owner need not have a moment's worry about them. I have records of trucks operated in practically every class of business, showing that pneumatic truck tires have been in service anywhere from one to two and one half years, and during the entire time have never been off the rims.

"The rural free delivery division of the United States Post Office Department operates a fleet of trucks on pneumatics that is probably larger than any other in the country. They have had so few punctures that they no longer believe it necessary to carry spares.

"As for mileage, I find in our records reports on set after set of tires which have rendered better than 20,000 miles. We have records through the United States in practically every class of service of from 10,000 to 50,000 miles and those of 40,000 to 50,000 were in extremest hard service. The United States Nobby Cord pneumatic is especially adapted to muddy or rough roads where good traction is essential."

CASUALTIES DUE TO RANK CARELESSNESS

Drivers Fail to Comply With Few Simple Rules.

Don't Rely Wholly on Other Fellow Doing Right Thing—Look Carefully Both Ways in Crossing Streets and Go Slow.

"Most automobile accidents are due to lack of a little common sense and carelessness in complying with a few simple driving rules. It isn't always the first-time owner who gets his name in the accident columns," says George Stowe, president of a motor-car company.

First assume that you must look out for yourself and the other fellow, too. Don't rely wholly on the other fellow doing the right thing and you'll be on your guard if he does the wrong thing.

Never back or swing from the curb into the street without looking back to see if the way is clear.

Glance both ways on each cross street, and if you're not on the main thoroughfare slow down before you cross. It's safest to drive slowly enough to have the car well under control where buildings hide intersecting streets.

Do not cut corners in turning, but keep to your side of the street and look both ways before you make a turn.

Put out a hand as a guide to the car following or approaching.

If passing a slower vehicle pass on your left, but in passing a street car always keep to the right.

Do not follow another vehicle too closely. It might stop suddenly.

Stop when the street car ahead of you stops and stand still till all passengers getting off are out of the street.
