In the Child Welfare campaign of Cedar City no new organizations have been formed to carry out the projects, but certain committees have been appointed to assist the officers already in charge in our local clubs and church organizations. The outline for the year's work embraces supervised play, supervised work, a free dental clinic and the establishing of a school lunch. Those backing the movement at present are: Farm Bureau and schools, through the club workers, the Mutuals through the Boy Scouts and Beehive girls, the Relief Society and the Home Economics club; the Mayor and City Council have also extended a willing and helping hand.
