**THEY EARN A LIVING.**

Some of the French clergy have taken to poultry raising, others breed rabbits. The parish priest of Labourgade, in the Tarn and Garonne, has already earned a reputation for his jams and jellies. Many priests have become workmen. The parish priest of La Fagnolle is a turner, another in Averton, in the Lot-et-Cher, mends bicycles and sewing machines. The parish priest of Mayet de Montagne, in the Allier, and of Serriers, in Cor-sica, manufacture acetylene lamps, and the priest who officiates in the parish church of Manages, in the Meuse, is a working locksmith. One of the industries most generally adopted by the clergy is that of watch and clock maker. Seven parish priests are already so employed. The parish priest of Cavier, in the Gard, is a tailor, and his colleague in Negron, in the Indre et Loire, is an upholsterer. A dozen others knit stockings and waistcoats, while the priest of Hericourt, in the Haute Saone, has become a printer. A certain number of priests are bookbinders, and many are photographers. Two parish priests—one of Saint Paul, in the Oise, and another of Magnilles Reigniers, in the Vendee—are artists, the former painting pictures and the second using the sculptor's chisel.

These priest workmen have formed an association for the defense of their interests, and it will be curious to see from what quarter the attack will be made. Of all the cries that were raised against the clergy and still more against religious women in France, the most vociferous and the most generally urged, even by practicing Catholics, was that which accused them of competing unfairly with laymen and laywomen in trades and professions. Now that they are no longer salaried by the state, that grievance can hardly survive; yet it is among the little troubles of life that the deprivation of their stipends forces the clergy into that very competition which was formerly counted among their offenses.

**THE NEW BATTLESHIPS.**

While comments on the 20,000-ton battleship being designed by the navy department indicate that congress will not be likely to consider it seriously, yet there is a strong probability that a better fate will be accorded for a 25,000-ton battleship, with auxiliary oil burners, torpedo protectors, rangefinders and other improvements and innovations in naval construction. Such plans have been prepared by the board of naval construction. As far as known in Washington, they mark an advance on anything yet designed abroad. Such a ship would have a draught of twenty-eight feet, a speed of twenty-four knots and horsepower of 25,000. The increase in battleship displacement is at the rate of 2,000 tons annually and the limit seems to be only in the depth of harbor entrances and by docks. As to defense against torpedoes, "something definite seems likely to accrue from an investigation by a special board on the subject, which has inquired into the use and disposition of searchlights on ships, board to frustrate torpedo attacks, and has devised plans for the arrangement of armament to be used in repelling torpedoes.

**EDITORIAL NEWS BRIEFS.**

At Beatrice, Neb., a plant has been established for the manufacture of gas from the waste matter of the farm. The new gas plant is not an experiment on a small scale, but a full-fledged gas manufacturing, and its product is lighting the streets of the city and furnishing gas for heating and lighting hundreds of homes. Instead of paying out hundreds of dollars every day to coal mines and railroads for material from which to make the gas which it sells, the Beatrice plant buys up straw, cobs, corn-stalks and things of that kind, throws them into the retorts and the result is a splendid gas with 10 per cent more heating power than the best coal gas known. And ton for ton, the straw and cobs make 60 per cent more gas than does the best coal gas known. And after the gas is extracted, there remains 600 pounds of the best coke obtainable. In the case of straw, almost pure carbon remains. And this coke is burned beneath the retorts, thus producing the heat necessary to make more gas and more coke.

The coast country of Texas is suffering for fresh water. Wells which have flowed for twenty-five years are going dry. Scientists and oil experts declare the operations in the south Texas oil fields have affected the artesian watersheds and that unless a great change takes place in the interior of the earth in the near future, this section will be waterless. Galveston's fresh water supply is taken from artesian wells on the mainland, seventeen miles from the city. The people of Galveston are now consuming several thousand gallons a day in excess of the supply of 3,500,000 gallons. The supply from the thirty wells is gradually decreasing, and wells supplying 20,000 acres of rice lands with water have ceased flowing.

In the Cape house of assembly recently Mr. Walton, the treasurer, gave notice that he would move for the imposition of a profit tax of 10 per cent on diamond and copper mining companies earning over \$250,000 per annum. The income tax of 31 cents on the pound on incomes of from \$50,000 to \$100,000 and the tax of 27 cents on incomes of \$100,000 and over would be retained, but the tax of 43 cents on incomes exceeding \$500,000 would be abandoned, as would also the 8 1/2 per cent profit tax into which Dr. Jamieson announced on the 16th ult. the government was prepared to change the income tax.


