
The Smoker given by the Young Men's Republican club at the republican headquarters on Wednesday evening was a most successful affair. Great enthusiasm was evoked and a spirit of confidence was in the air. A feature of the meeting was the large number of former "Americans" who were in attendance and openly declared that they had had enough of the party of spoils.

Gray and Jackeman of this city publish a number of papers in as many different places, the matter being chiefly the same, but more or less be-

ing localized in order to give each production the appearance of being published where it is dated. As to the correctness or otherwise of such an arrangement we have nothing to say; nor would there be any fault found with any policy pursued or expressions made pursuant thereto if proper methods prevailed, which is not the case in every instance. One of the publications referred to is issued in this city under the name of the Argus, and it began and up to the last number continued as a republican paper with independent leaning. As such it obtained patronage and received more or less recognition in various ways. All at once, in the number of last Sunday, it blossomed out as a full-fledged supporter of the "American" (Kearns) ticket. In order to disguise its proceeding in this respect somewhat—a highly commendable thing as showing they are ashamed of it—it is made to appear that the other political parties will also have a show, which the other parties will respectfully decline. It would be idle for the proprietors to say they have taken this step, designed to work injury to those whom their paper professed to support and who have supported it without having received some sort of pay for it. The talk

about the others being treated similarly is merely for appearance sake, to ease the thing up as it were, and not cause a loss of such measure of patronage and popularity as the paper had. If the gentlemen named choose to publish an "American" paper and proceed properly to do so, that is their business; it would not be straining the proprieties either, since one is known to be and the other suspected of being "American" right along.

Another case is that of a little sheet here called the Labor Press, in the last edition of which the "American" ticket appears, not as an advertisement but at the head of the editorial department, thereby being given the fullest endorsement and support. Let labor people who have been beguiled into patronizing the paper take notice accordingly. A majority of them are not "Americans" and will not permit themselves to be dragged into the camp of that element. The few paltry dollars, which these publications receive for their treachery would better be devoted to paying some part of the debts which the "American" bosses have contracted and disdainfully ignore. It is a scurvy lot all through, both as to men and methods.
