After an illness of five days, Peter A. Boyer, 78 years of age, and one of the pioneers of Ogden, died Friday at the home of his son, 133 Washington avenue. Death resulted from a complication of diseases.

Mr. Boyer was born in Denmark April 24, 1842, and came to Ogden more than forty years ago. He has resided here since. He is survived by one son, Neils Boyer, and one daughter, Mrs. Annie Thorsted, both of Ogden, and eight grandchildren. Funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock this afternoon at the home of Neils Boyer, 133 Washington avenue. Interment will take place in the Mountain View cemetery.
