



# Utah Aggies Will Clash With Ogden A. A. Gridders

## LOCAL STARS TO MEET "A" MEN OCTOBER 9

Aggie First Team Will Be Seen in Action Against Ogden A. A.

The Ogden Athletic club's grid machine will open the 1920 season against the fast Utah Aggie machine here Saturday, October 9th. Contracts for the game have been signed and the game will no doubt be a thriller. A return contest will be played on Adams field at Logan in 1921. The local organization is dicker with coast clubs for games during the coming season and it is probable that one of the best teams in the Northwest will be in action here during the football season.

Coach Tommy Fitzpatrick of the University of Utah is dicker with the local organization for a game here about October 16. Plans for this contest will be made during the next ten days. In meeting the Utah Aggies the local organization will clash with one of the greatest grid machines in the west. The Aggies have a rattling good line-up for the 1920 season with such men as Falck, Dee, Hansen, Jarvis, Peterson, Spencer, Worley, Andrus, McDonaid and others in suits.

The local team will be composed of old-timers of both high school and college class and training for the season will start early in September.

King Football will enter his fifty-first year during the coming season and will be given a great reception in Utah and especially in Ogden. With the Ogden A. A. team in the field together with the Ogden high school and Weber Normal the fans should see plenty of the grid sport. It is highly probable that the annual contest between the Aggies and Utah will be staged here Tuesday day.

Although the grid season is months away, the coaches of Utah colleges are making preparations for the coming grid. The officials of the Ogden A. A. are also scheduling games and the officers expect to be able to publish their entire schedule during the next few days.

### SPORT SHORTS

Sam Langford never objects to any activity in the athletic field. Recently he gave Marty Cutler an interesting argument in a benefit wrestling bout in Chicago. Fred Fulton denies he has entered into negotiations to fight Jack Johnson in Mexico. Fulton says he cannot see that a victory over the former champion would do him any good. Fulton admits he received offers to meet Johnson, but he adds he never even replied to the communications.

Johnny Dundee expects to lay off the fight game for about five weeks. He has been complaining of intestinal disorders, and recently was obliged to cancel two matches. A New Jersey specialist orders the weight to be reduced and rest, otherwise he would probably have to give up the mitt sport entirely.

Clarke Griffith of Washington says Boston overlooked a good bet when they shipped Maurice Shannon to him in the Roth deal. Griffith has played Shannon on third base, and now the New England youngster is showing better form than at any other time in his major league career. In spring exhibition games Shannon has been bumping the pill at a lively rate.

Coach Heisman of Pennsylvania will take no chances on poor tackling by the Penn gridiron warriors next season. He recently ordered six tackling dummy outfits and served notice that almost all of the spring practice would be devoted to correct tackling methods. Heisman says Penn was weak in tackling when the red and blue met his famous Georgia Tech outfit.

Harry Frazee, owner of the Boston Red Sox, informed members of his team he had received information of their plan to revolt in case he traded Wally Shang. The players denied the truth of the assertion. Frazee told the players he was willing to settle with Shang, but that the player had come forth with prohibitive demands. The Shang-Frazee controversy, however, is as good as settled now.

Coach Glen Warner of the University of Pittsburgh recently announced that he would not be present to direct spring football practice. He has left instructions with an assistant. Warner says the importance of spring practice has been greatly overestimated by some authorities.

He is big and strong and has a wonderful sandlot record performing on the best teams around Cleveland. He looks every bit as good as George Uble looked a year ago.

"They're all first-string catchers—I have no second-string men," Tris remarked.

### Quaker Embassy in Berlin Is Planned

Lucian Jenkins, a negro whose life was threatened by a mob the night of April 17, one day after the assault, was exonerated by the jury.

### WILL CUT MELON.

PHILADELPHIA, April 30.—The directors of the Cramp Shipbuilding company at a meeting today voted to add \$15,000,000 to the capital of the concern. Ten millions of this will be distributed to stockholders in the form of a stock dividend. This represents 150 per cent. The present capital is \$6,250,000.

### National Title Track Meet Set For Harvard

NEW YORK, April 29.—The junior and senior track field championship events of the National Amateur Athletic union will be held at the Harvard stadium July 15 and 17. It was announced tonight by the chairman, Frederick W. Rubien. He said the events will serve as a final tryout to select an Olympic track and field team. Plans are also being made, he added, to conduct a pentathlon championship which will be designated as an official Olympic tryout.
