PLANING MILL MEN ON STRIKE

Workers Quit When Demand for 90 Cents an Hour Is Refused

SALT LAKE, May 1.—With over a hundred employees striking, five planing mills of Salt Lake closed down this morning. D. O. Jacobs, business agent for the Carpenters' union, claims that the dispute concerns wages alone. Managers of some of the planing mills say that the men not only demand an increase in pay, but strongly object to the "American plan" being put into effect.

600 Car Repair Men in Salt Lake Return

SALT LAKE, May 1.—Approximately 600 car repair shop workers employed by the Denver & Rio Grande railway here who were laid off recently because of the switchmen's strike, were notified by the company late today to return to work immediately. Officials state that but one hundred of the 250 strikers have returned and that conditions are nearly normal.

SALT LAKE, May 1.—Six hundred car repair men of the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad company, laid off because of lack of work occasioned by the calling of the switchmen's strike, are expected to return to work Monday, D. C. Cunningham, superintendent of motive power, today reported. With the resumption of work in this department, the switchmen's strike will be a thing of the past, as far as Salt Lake is concerned, it is reported. Nearly all of the men who were laid off have returned to work, the employees who are not working at present not having learned of the restarting of operations today. The hundred men who were still out today are expected to be on the job Monday.

Alleged Cracksmen Caught in Salt Lake

SALT LAKE, May 1.—James Steelman, 23 years old, thought by police to be the safe cracksmen who has been entering a number of local stores recently, was captured this morning at 6:30 o'clock by Patrolman W. M. Madson as he was leaving the Rubber Products company, 139 East Second South street.

Madson captured the man after chasing him several blocks. The fugitive was halted when Madson shot him in the leg, just below the knee. Investigation disclosed the fact, the police say, that Steelman had broken open the Rubber Products safe with a heavy hammer, extracting \$42.80 in cash and a check of over \$5.

IMPROVEMENTS AT REXBURG UNDER WAY

REXBURG, Ida., May 1.—Rexburg this week began more than \$500,000 worth of building, consisting mostly of store property. Work will soon begin on a modern school building, which is planned to be completed during the summer months.

OFFER FOR SCHOOL BONDS STIRS PROTEST

Bids from six bond companies were opened yesterday, the highest being that of the Sweet, Causey & Foster company of Denver. The Denver company offered \$90,076 on the \$100.

MANY SEEKING SPIRIT GLUES

Visits of Maeterlinck and Lodge Add Members to Research Work

By LORRY A. JACOBS, N. E. A. Staff Correspondent. NEW YORK, April 28.—The visits of Sir Oliver Lodge and Maurice Maeterlinck to this country have given a great impetus to psychic research work and has drawn hundreds of new members to the American Society for Physical Research.

"We have had thousands of questions concerning psychic research lately," said Gertrude Ogden Tubby, assistant secretary of the society. "And among them the question asked most is, 'Who is considered the greatest living medium?'"

"It is probably safe to say that among the leading mediums of the present time, are Mrs. Piper, Mrs. Chenoweth, Mrs. Salter, Mrs. Smead, Mr. Thompson and Mrs. Tieknor. All of these mediums have produced results that have been verified and reported at length both by the English and American societies for psychic research. They are endorsed by Dr. Hodgson, secretary of the English society, and Dr. Hyslop of the American society.

"The most notable example perhaps of the work of a medium is the art work produced by the medium, Thompson, under the inspiration of R. S. Gifford. All of the work of the other mediums, of course, has been reported at great length and that of Mrs. Piper stands out among these.

"These are thousands of instances that prove to us who believe in psychic power that we are right in our belief. These are usually divided into three main classes—cases where messages are received through a medium relating to lost articles or matters that are known to no human being, predictions of future events, and the solving of difficult problems of life through elimination work by a medium.

"Perhaps the best examples of the first named class of work of mediums are the thousands of cases no human could possibly have known of the whereabouts of the will had it not been for the aid of a medium.

"Of the third class there are thousands of cases where mediums have solved business problems.

"Raps" Unreliable. Practically all of the cases I have referred to are cases of message mediums. Materializing mediums are almost invariably unreliable. Message mediums are, of course, those mediums who produce messages from the spirit world. Materializing mediums are those who claim to produce the spirit in material form, or material things, such as raps.

"Telepathy, we claim, is an established fact. But, the process is not yet understood. It is, of course, our theory, that a thought is transmitted from an animate person to an inanimate one and through the inanimate one to another animate.

"But, of course, this is theory. There have been so many thousands of cases of telepathy that we cannot doubt if any longer and telepathy we believe is the subject most open for investigation."

ROTARIANS TO TAKE UP SCHOOL PROBLEM

POCATELLO, May 1.—A committee of Rotarians was appointed yesterday to seek a remedy to the school situation in Pocatello, which is rapidly becoming acute, following an appeal before the club members by Jesse R. Budge, president of the school board. The committee consists of Harry Peterson, Earle White, and Joe Bistline.

The schools in common with all other organizations and enterprises, find themselves seriously embarrassed in providing sufficient funds to meet the demands of increased prices," said President Budge.

"All supplies and furniture have increased in cost and the salaries which must be paid to employes is more than heretofore, in order to meet the high cost of living. The teaching situation is most acute, as teachers cannot be obtained for next year at the salaries they accepted this year.

DR. NEFF APPOINTED STATE WAR HISTORIAN

SALT LAKE, May 1.—Dr. George Thomas, head of the department of economics of the University of Utah, has been appointed to succeed D. W. Farratt, as secretary of the Utah State Historical Society, and Dr. Andrew L. Neff, assistant professor of American history is named as Utah war historian.

The historian will use a fund of \$4,000 left over from the 1919 appropriation made by the state legislature and apply it in the massing of information concerning the part played by Utahans in the war with the Central Powers.
