

Who Will Win First, Elephant or Donkey? Parties Contest For Women's Favor

WOMEN SELECT 4 STATES TO TEST SUPPORT

To Party Whose States Ratify Amendment Will Go Fealty Say Leaders

WASHINGTON, May 8.—Who is the best friend of suffrage? The Democratic party or the Republican?

The National Woman's Party is after the truth. It has the stage set for a contest which should reveal it. Two Democratic and two Republican states have been chosen—North Carolina and Louisiana, Democratic, and Vermont and Connecticut, Republican.

The party whose states ratify the suffrage amendment first, will go the fealty and support of the women.

State Chairmen Lead. Two southern women of Democratic persuasion will wage intensive campaigns for the amendment in the southern states—Mrs. E. St. Clair Thompson Spruce Pines, N. C., state chairman of the National Woman's Party in Vermont, and Mrs. Katherine Hepburn, Hartford, Conn., state chairman in Connecticut.

Delaware is expected to ratify the woman suffrage amendment soon and give the 35th state. But with the achievement of success, the women say, it will be still a draw between the two parties as to which has done the most for the cause.

Hopes in North and South. In North Carolina the Democratic party has adopted a plank for ratification and Governor T. W. Bickett has promised to call a special session in July. Louisiana once voted suffrage down in a referendum, the city of New Orleans administering the defeat, suf-

frage receiving a majority of the votes outside of New Orleans. The Louisiana Legislature meets in regular session in May and is expected to pass favorably on suffrage.

No sessions are scheduled in Vermont and Connecticut, but the Republican party is considered to have an advantage in the fact that the Vermont Legislature last year passed a pres-

idential suffrage bill, which Governor Clement vetoed. It is expected that it called into special session the Legislature will ratify.

In Connecticut the Republican convention has adopted a resolution asking Governor M. H. Hollcomb to call a special session. Further, the constitution gives the Legislature the right to convene itself.

The handicap of the Republicans is that both governors have steadfastly refused to convene their legislatures. This, it is said, offsets the handicap of the Democrats of being in the south where suffrage has been unpopular. Anyhow, the race is on!

TRAFFIC RULES AS CONTAINED IN CITY ORDINANCES OUTLINED FOR AUTO DRIVERS BY CITY OFFICIAL

With automobiles in greater demand than factories seem able to supply, danger to pedestrians is ever increasing while automobile collisions, due to lack of knowledge regarding traffic laws and ordinances, carelessness of drivers, and various other causes, the greatest of these being perhaps the ever increasing number of inexperienced motorists, occur daily.

Assistant City Attorney Samuel Powell maintains that automobile accidents are like other disastrous events. The human element enters largely into each accident, he said, and while injuries from mechanical defects of automobiles and motor driven vehicles occur from time to time, the greater number of accidents result through carelessness of drivers or ignorance of laws regulating traffic.

Attorney Powell has outlined the most important section of the city ordinances governing the use of automobiles or other motor driven vehicles within the city of Ogden. A few of the ordinances, to which special attention to those who are not acquainted with traffic ordinances of the city, are as follows:

Cars traveling east and west have the right of way over cars from the north and south and the right hand rule will be observed by motorists except in such cases where following the rule is impossible.

Vehicles overtaking other vehicles should pass on the left side, not turning to the right until the first vehicle has been passed.

Upon receiving a signal from a horn, bell or other signalling apparatus on a vehicle to the rear, the motor or other vehicle in the lead should turn to the right.

In rounding a corner motorists should keep well towards the curb and in turning to the left should keep to the right of the center line of the intersection. Right of way should be given to vehicles traveling in the same direction.

Mufflers on self propelled vehicles should be closed and no car should be left unattended when the engine is running.

One of the most important of the traffic ordinances and one which is not generally observed provides that no vehicle shall be left standing in a street or alley without lights.

No drivers should back his vehicle without first sounding a warning. Upon the approach of fire apparatus,

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Drug Frauds Put Over "Cocaine" Had No Kick 'Twas Only Rock Candy

(By GODFREY MATTHEWS) The work of a federal food and drug inspector is at all times interesting, sometimes amusing, and always absorbing, says A. S. Daggett, formerly federal food and drug inspector of the Pacific coast, but now chief director of the inspection service of the National Canners' association, Utah branch.

The top section of a series of good looking book cases in Mr. Daggett's office is full of small bottles, accurately labeled, containing many of the counterfeits for real food and drugs which Mr. Daggett discovered during his tenure of the federal appointment he has recently relinquished.

Bogus Coffee. "Most of the counterfeits we discovered during my time were positively harmless and were meant to reduce the cost of the product on the market," said Mr. Daggett. "Among the commonest of these and sometimes the hardest to discover were substitutes for coffee in the form of peas and beans, and grains of all kinds. Some of the counterfeit went to the great trouble of pouring macaroni into molds that made it look like a bean, then they were colored with some harmless liquid to represent the coffee bean and used to adulterate quantities of the pure material."

"Another common method of coffee adulteration was the use of exhausted coffee grounds taken from restaurants, dried out and poured into sacks of the real stuff," said Mr. Daggett, who thereupon produced what he considers to be his "great find" in the shape of a perfectly legitimate looking bottle which was one of 500 seized in Denver, Colo.

Humorous Fraud. "To the minutest detail this bottle and its contents is one of the most harmless and humorous frauds I have ever known. The bottle is the exact size and color. The seal is correct to the letter. The label is accurate. It purports to be a bottle containing one ounce of cocaine. On the circular edge of the seal appears the words 'Baldwin and Weeks,' and a monogram, 'B. W.' On the label is the legend 'B. W. Montreal Cocaine Hydrochloride. Largest crystals. Highest Purity. Medicinal.' Then another separate label bearing the words 'Guaranteed by Baldwin and Weeks under the Federal Food and Drug Act, June 30, 1906.'"

Five hundred one-ounce bottles of this stuff was sold by a man to druggists in Denver, Colo., who had a large clientele among drug fields, and the whole story was spilled to the police of that city by one of the friends who complained that he had bought some cocaine at a certain drug store and that the stuff "had no kick to it."

Rock Candy. The bottle contains nothing more harmful than rock candy crystals, says Mr. Daggett, who said that the bottles were sold by the "crook" to the druggists at a dollar and a quarter each, and were in turn sold by them to the friends for five dollars a bottle.
