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LITTLE BUYING OF HIGH FLOUR

Many Mills Refuse to Quote Because of Inability to Secure Wheat

MINNEAPOLIS, May 12.—The Northwestern Miller's review of the flour trade says: With wheat prices for best grades ranging from three dollars to three dollars fifty cents flour prices have gone steadily upward since spring patents now averaging close to sixteen dollars per barrel, hard winters, fifteen and soft winters, fourteen. Inquiry is active but actual buying is in relatively small lots. Many mills have refused to quote on account of inability to secure sufficient wheat. Patent flour prices are still about a dollar and a half less than three years ago. Feed prices have reached a new high point with bran averaging close to sixty dollars per ton, but a decline is generally expected. The flour output though greatly curtailed by the car shortage, is showing gradual improvement. The spring wheat mills last week reporting an output representing forty-two per cent of capacity. The Kansas-Oklahoma hard winter wheat mills fifty-four per cent, and the Ohio valley per cent. It is generally believed Friday at the Chicago conference will be able soon to dispel much of the uncertainty which just now is disturbing the trade.

WILL ORGANIZE WORLD FARMERS

"Why Don't Farmers Strike?" Is Question in Talk At Chicago

CHICAGO, May 11.—Representatives of farm organizations in the United States and Canada met here today to discuss the establishment of an international board of agriculture. United States farmers were represented by delegates from the National Board of Farm Organizations, and farmers' unions affiliated with this organization. N. H. Lambert, Winnipeg, secretary of the Canadian council of agriculture, who addressed the meeting, said that agriculture is completely organized in Canada and exercises immense influence on dominion politics. Milo D. Campbell, of Cold Water, Mich., who was until recently president of the national board, made a plea for better understanding, both between Canadians and citizens of the United States and between farmers labor and capital. The farmers of the country, he declared, are the element to save it in this time of change and unrest. "Why don't the farmers strike as labor has been striking," he asked. "Because the farmer has no piece of ground and has an interest in the general welfare of the country. It is not that he is at heart more patriotic than the industrial worker. And the thing which will solve the question of labor unrest will be to give the laborer an interest in his work, just as the farmer has."

Thousands of Jews in Redemption Parade

NEW YORK, May 12.—In contrast to demonstrations of mourning and protest held in New York in the past, thousands of Jews yesterday took part in the Jewish, or redemption parade in joyfulness that Palestine is to be the Jewish homeland under a British mandate. It was the climax of the extraordinary Zionist convention that opened here last Sunday. The parade, headed by two of the oldest orthodox rabbis in New York, carrying the "scrolls of the law," and a detachment of Jewish members of the "most battalion" first passed through the densely populated east-side, then to Washington square, where other sections joined the column for the march up Fifth avenue to the arch.

ASK SAMUEL TO RULE PALESTINE

U. S. Supreme Justice Brandeis Once Considered as Commissioner

LONDON, May 12.—(By the Associated Press).—Prior to the granting to Great Britain of the mandate for Palestine, Louis D. Brandeis, associate justice of the supreme court of the United States, and the Right Hon. Herbert L. Samuel, former secretary of state for home affairs, were most favored for the post of high commissioner, according to information received by The Associated Press. But, Great Britain having been made the mandatory power virtually eliminated consideration of the American jurist and an official announcement of the appointment of Mr. Samuel is regarded as assured within a few days. Mr. Samuel recently returned from a three months' tour of Palestine, where as official commissioner of the British government he was delegated to investigate and report on financial, economic and other considerations pertaining to the transition of Palestine from military to civil control. A romantic sidelight to Samuel's prospective appointment as high commissioner to Palestine, is the engagement of his son Edwin to Hadassah Graevsky, of Jaffa, whom he met while serving as a lieutenant in a British regiment in Palestine.

MARSHAL FLYNN DEAD.

OMAHA, Neb., May 12.—Succumbing to an illness that had confined him to his bed for many weeks, Thomas J. Flynn, United States marshal, died at his home here tonight. The end had been expected and Mr. Flynn himself was aware that he could not survive much longer and on Saturday he called in his closest friends and bade them farewell.

AUSTRIA AND MAYBE HUNGARY IN LEAGUE

GENEVA, May 10.—Austria and probably Hungary may be admitted to the league of nations at its first general meeting this summer, it is learned from a high source. Germany, Bulgaria and possibly Turkey will be made members at the second session, the date of which has not been fixed. Germany, it is reported, will participate in the international financial conference at Brussels on the same basis as the allied nations, and it is further pointed out that this is part of the plan of the allies to re-establish as soon as possible political and commercial relations with former enemy countries, taking the league of nations as the shortest course to accomplish this end. The first general meeting of the league of nations will be held at Geneva.

UNITED STATES URGED TO EAT MORE BREAD

TOPEKA, Kan., May 11.—Food consumption in the United States could be cut two billion dollars a year if the public would consume twenty per cent more bread in substitution for other foods, said D. P. Chindom, secretary of the American Association of the Baking Industry, today, in an address before the Transmississippi Association of the Baking Industry in convention here. "The American people do not consume the proper proportion of bread. The United States uses about half as much bread, proportionately, as does France," he added.

Seven vice chairmen were also elected as follows: Representatives Ferris, Phelan, Massachusetts; Gandy, South Dakota; Rouse, Kentucky; Raker, California; Welby, Ohio, and Caldwell, New York.

24 HOURS AS MAYOR

FAYETTEVILLE, N. C., May 12.—Twenty-four hours as mayor of Fayetteville with a hostile board of aldermen was enough for Mayor Charles Rankin, and after holding the office once around the clock he handed in his resignation. Rankin charged that the board of aldermen had taken over all his functions.

WYOMING REPUBLICANS CONDEMN PRES. WILSON

SHERIDAN, Wyo., May 12.—Condemnation of the "gross extravagance" of the Wilson administration and commendation of the Republican congress in cutting \$2,000,000,000 from appropriation bills were the outstanding features of the platform submitted to the Republican state convention at its closing session here. Other planks endorse more adequate compensation for school teachers and legislative action giving rural children the same opportunities enjoyed through town and city schools. States which have not ratified the federal suffrage amendment are urged to do so in time for the 1920 election, in resolutions adopted by the convention.

EX-NAVY OFFICER HELD FOR FORGERY

PHOENIX, Ariz., May 12.—Evans A. Powell, former lieutenant, 1st day corps, United States navy, was held under bond of \$5,000 to appear before the federal grand jury at San Francisco on a charge of impersonating a naval officer and passing bogus mittel having cashed \$12,000 in checks, issuing them from a government pay checkbook. It requires 500 operations to make a watch balance-wheel.

HIGH PRICES GROUND WORK OF DISCONTENT

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 12.—Governor John J. Cornwell of West Virginia told the joint convention of the American Hardware Manufacturing association and the Southern Hardware Jobbers' association here that high prices are the ground work of discontent. "I believe if the merchants of this country would make up their minds to forego profits for three or four months, and sell the things which our people must have at cost and a reasonable commission, they would go far toward knocking the bottom out of unrest and discontent," he declared.

O'Dowd Beats Clark

CAMDEN, N. J., May 12.—Mike O'Dowd, former middleweight champion, won his ten round bout with Jackie Clark of Allentown, Pa., here. O'Dowd was the aggressor throughout and had the better of eight of the ten rounds, all of which were fast and furious.
