

EX-WIFE READY TO FACE CHARGE

Connect Chicago Woman, Now in Los Angeles, With Murder of Husband

CHICAGO, May 12.—Mrs. Victoria Colosimo, first wife of "Big Jim" colosimo who was murdered in his restaurant here Tuesday afternoon, has been located in Los Angeles, according to a Chicago morning newspaper. Police here had been searching for her, as the result of a rumor that she had arrived in Chicago on the day Colosimo was shot.

She said she was ready to return to Chicago and aid the authorities in solving the mystery of the shooting, according to the newspapers.

First Wife's Story

LOS ANGELES, Cal., May 12.—Mrs. Victoria Colosimo, first wife of "Big Jim" Colosimo, of Chicago, who was shot and killed here Tuesday has been visiting relatives here for some time. Mrs. Colosimo said she would return to Chicago at once, and would there attempt to secure the estate of Colosimo.

Mrs. Colosimo said she believed Colosimo's second marriage was invalid, she said, they were divorced in Illinois and he went to Indiana and re-married within the year which she said the Illinois law provided must elapse before a divorced person can re-marry legally.

Mrs. Colosimo denied that her relations with a third person had caused separation, or needed any defense.

UTAH REPUBLICANS TO ADVERTISE THIS STATE

SALT LAKE, May 12.—When the Utah delegates to the Republican national convention leave on June 5 for Chicago, they will start a publicity campaign intended to bring this state prominently before the political leaders and others, according to Chairman Henry Welsh of the state committee. Arrangements are being made by the state committee and delegates to advertise Utah by all possible distinctive methods the state chairman said.

A Pullman has been chartered to carry the delegates to Chicago over the Oregon Short Line, Union-Pacific and Chicago and Northwestern railroads. A suite of six rooms has been reserved at the Great Northern hotel at a cost of \$110 a day, as state headquarters.

Others besides delegates and alternates who plan to attend the convention and who desire to be in touch with Utah Republican headquarters can secure Chicago hotel reservations through the state headquarters, according to Secretary Le Mar Nelson.

LACK FUNDS TO MAP FEDERAL LANDS IN UTAH

SALT LAKE, May 12.—Although eight government surveying parties are in the field, yet only one-fifth of the request for surveys can be reached this year, according to L. C. Thoresen, surveyor general of Utah.

But \$50,000 is allowed the state of Utah for surveying of government land in 1920 and Mr. Thoresen finds that in view of the high cost of supplies he will be unable to place more than eight parties on the work.

The surveyors in charge of parties this year, according to D. D. Kirkpatrick, assistant supervisor of surveys are H. W. Miller, R. Gentry, J. C. Clark, A. Nelson, James P. Quigley, J. C. Thomas, Chauncey J. Terry and Elliott Bird.

DENIES HIDING GOLD IN HIS WOODEN LEG

DENVER, Colo., May 12.—Orville Harrington, former employe of the Denver mint, was sentenced to 10 years in the United States penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kan., today following a plea of guilty to stealing \$80,000 in gold-anodes from the mine. The gold was recovered. Harrington begged Judge Robert E. Lewis, presiding, for mercy, because of a wife and two children.

In court today Harrington's attorney denied the story given at the time of his arrest that Harrington had hidden the stolen gold in his wooden leg.

MAY CHOOSE 14 M. E. BISHOPS

Seven New Residences and Seven Vacancies to Be Acted Upon

DES MOINES, Ia., May 12.—The Methodist Episcopal church will elect fourteen new bishops, if the report of the committee on episcopacy, ready to be presented today, is adopted. The committee's report recommends seven new residences. All except one are in foreign fields; where the church has had an almost phenomenal growth during the past few years.

The residences abroad are as follows: Shanghai, China; Calcutta, India; Singapore, Malaysia; Mexico City, Mexico; Paris, France; and Copenhagen, Denmark.

In addition there are also seven bishops to be elected to fill existing vacancies. Vacancies in the United States which must be filled include Portland, Oregon, and Helena, Mont. Those abroad include Peking, China, and Manila, P. I.

If the report of the committee is adopted, it will mean that additions will be made to the foreign fields as follows:

In China—Three bishops instead of two.

In southern Asia—Four bishops instead of two.

In Latin America and South America—Two bishops instead of one.

In Europe—Three bishops instead of one.


Rotarians Tell of Business Experiences

Miss Marion Hollins of Westwood, Long Island, the only American survivor, was defeated in the fourth round by Miss Molly Griffiths, who won by a score of 8 up and 4 to play.

JOHNSON TO PROVE SELF NOT RADICAL

NEW YORK, May 12.—Senator Hiram W. Johnson will make a tour of the larger cities in the east and middle west between now and the date of the Republican convention in Chicago, with a view of placing his candidacy for the Republican presidential nomination before business men. It was announced at Johnson headquarters here today. It was said that the itinerary would include New York, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Cleveland and Chicago. Senator Johnson's speeches on this tour, it was stated, would be designed to counteract a flood of literature disseminated among business men, picturing him as an extreme radical.
