

## OWEN ATTACKS RESERVE BOARD

Loan Money to Speculators in Stock Market, Not to Farmers, He Says

PONCA CITY, Okla., May 26.—Senator Robert L. Owen has issued a statement in which he took issue with the views of W. P. C. Harding, governor of federal reserve board, in his letter written to the United States senate, declaring that he objected to the board's raising the rate of interest on loans in all parts of the country and for all purposes. He said: "The board's raising the rate of interest on loans in all parts of the country and for all purposes and causing thereby a period of distrust and a breaking down of value of government bonds. Owners of bonds who bought them as security in the intention of using them as security in obtaining loans now are denied the privilege of borrowing money on the bonds. The federal reserve board, an arm of the government which urged the purchase of government bonds, now is in the position of ruining the people who bought the bonds. "The federal reserve board has no right to say what is essential and what is not essential. This matter should be left to the bankers of the country. "As regards the mobilization of credit for moving of the 1920 crop, I say that the federal reserve board has interfered with the lending of money by insurance companies and farm loan companies for the production of crops. Under the board's policy, the banks have found it more profitable to lend to those who would pay a higher rate of interest and use the money to buy stocks on a broken market. Those men get a loan at a rate of interest of 1 per cent and then make 100 per cent."

## SOVIETS NOT AFTER TERRITORIAL EXPANSION

LONDON, May 21.—A wireless message addressed by the soviet government at Moscow to the governments of Great Britain, France, Italy and the United States was received here. The message says, among other things, that the soviet republics of Russia and Ukraine are free from territorial ambition, that they have no aggressive designs against other countries and that they are devoting themselves to economic reconstruction. It adds that in spite of heroic efforts for the inauguration of peace negotiations with the Polish government, Poland launched fresh attacks against the two republics.

## YANKEE RELIEF PARTY RETURNS TO ARMENIA

NEW YORK, May 26.—The American relief commission, headed by Col. William Haskell, which was forced to leave Armenia a few weeks ago, following Turk and Bolshevik uprisings, is returning to that country, according to a cable dispatch received here today by the near east relief. The cable set forth that the situation in the troubled regions of Armenia was improving, that the Armenian troops had retaken Alexandropol, and that the Near East warehouses, seized in one of the outbreaks, had been returned.

## SEATTLE HOTEL FIRE IS WORK OF INCENDIARY

SEATTLE, Wash., May 25.—The Lincoln hotel fire in Seattle in which four lives were lost, was probably the work of an incendiary. Fire Marshall Harry W. Bringham asserted today. Ten fires in this city during the last month were of like origin, according to the fire marshal, and six of these were set in the basements of hotels. The police are at work on the incendiary theory.

## POLICE INSPECTOR IS INDICTED BY PERJURY

NEW YORK, May 25.—Police Inspector Dominick Henry, of the tenderloin, recently acquitted in the court of general sessions of alleged neglect of duty in connection with New York's vice war, late today was indicted by the extraordinary grand jury on a charge of perjury. He was released in \$5,000 bail.

## HOUSE LEADERS "UP IN AIR" OVER RELIEF BILL

WASHINGTON, May 25.—House leaders were "up in the air" today over the question of soldier relief legislation. With Democrats and about fifty Republicans attempting to block immediate consideration, leaders started a new move in the hope of breaking the combination so that the bill might be presented to the house no later than Thursday.

## LUIS CABRERA REPORTED CAPTURED BY OBREGON

EL PASO, Texas, May 25.—Roberto V. Pesqueira, fiscal agent of the revolutionary government here, tonight received a telegram from Gen. Obregon announcing the capture of Luis Cabrera, formerly secretary of finance in the Carranza cabinet. Cabrera, according to the message, was taken yesterday at Villa Juarez, Puebla, and is now in Belem prison, Mexico City.

## REPORT MADE ON SLAUGHTER IN INTERCHURCH INDIA PROBED

Presbyterians Vote Down a Report of Commission Named to Investigate Causes of Unrest, Made Public

PHILADELPHIA, May 26.—After an all-day debate, the general assembly of the Presbyterian church in the United States today voted down the proposal of the executive commission to withdraw support of the inter-church movement and voted to recommit the whole matter to the commission for a revised report to be made as soon as possible. All proposed amendments and substitute resolutions were sent back to the executive commission.

Members of the commission, headed by Dr. J. W. Baer of Pasadena, Calif., retired to reconsider its recommendations. This action was taken as a partial victory by supporters of the inter-church movement. The motion was proposed by Rev. W. O. Forbes of Seattle, who declared he took the action in the interests of harmony. It is likely the executive commission will have its new report ready tomorrow.

None of the commissioners who took part in the debate favored the retention of the campaign in its present form. Those who spoke in favor of it admitted that many mistakes had been made, and the movement would have to be greatly modified, particularly as to its expenses.

NEW YORK, May 25.—Pre-war prices for Japanese silks within a very short time were predicted by M. Schlegel, prominent merchant of Osaka, before he sailed today for London.

"In February silks were three times higher than they were before the war," said the Japanese merchant. "They are now only half the price they were in February and the trend continues down."

A well bred Parisian is said to earn a comfortable livelihood by figuring as the fourteenth guest at dinner parties which otherwise would be attended by only 13 persons.

LONDON, May 26.—The findings of the commission appointed by the British government to investigate the causes of the unrest in India, with the attending disorders, was made public today. The incidents investigated included the Amritsar affair. In April, 1919, in which a slaughter occurred when a crowd of natives in the Jallianwala Bagh enclosure at Amritsar was fired upon by troops commanded by Gen. R. E. Dyer then in command in India. The commission, under the chairmanship of Lord Hunter, submitted two reports, a majority report by the five English members and a minority report by the three Indian members. An official summary of the two reports given out by the British government says in part: "With the exception of the Jallianwala Bagh and certain minor incidents, both the Indian and English members generally agree in justifying the firing done by the police and the military. They further agree in exonerating the government of India from all blame. "Regarding Amritsar, the English members hold that the outbreak was anti-government at every stage. The Indian members think that the anti-European sentiment developed subsequent to the firing on April 10, but do not dissent from the view that the firing was necessary."

## HUTCHINSON LEADS PROFESSIONAL GOLFERS

WEST BADEN, Ind., May 26.—Jock Hutchinson of the Edgewater golf club, Chicago, took the lead in the first day of the professional golf tournament on the West Baden springs course yesterday with a score of 156 for the 72 holes. His nearest competitor was M. Melhorn, Tulsa Country club, Tulsa, Okla., who turned in a score of 158. Leo Diegel, Lake Shore Country club, Chicago, was third, with 159, and Charles S. Mayo, the Belgian champion, who is playing as a member of the Edgewater Golf club, Chicago, with a score of 161, was fourth. Mayo's play attracted much attention from the large and enthusiastic gallery, as it was his first play in this country.

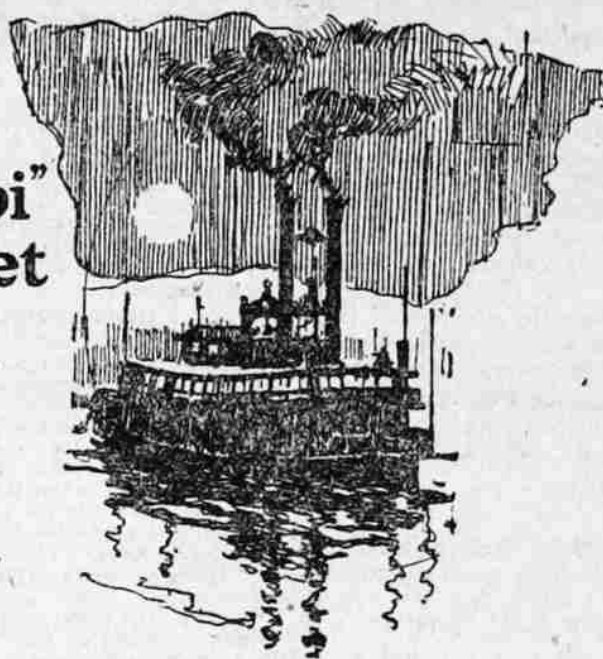
