ONE HIGHWAY TO LINK WEST'S WONDER PARKS

Utah Playground to Be on Proposed Hard-Surfaced Road; Pathfinder Coming

WASHINGTON, May 28.—A. L. Westgard, representing the American Automobile association, will leave here June 1 on a pathfinding motor trip to link in a single great highway a majority of the national parks in the west. Westgard's trip is preliminary to the educational tour which will start from Denver August 25 and complete the circuit of national parks, and which has as its purpose the development and building of a hard surfaced highway connecting the principal parks.

Twelve national parks would be included: Rocky Mountain, Colorado; Yellowstone, Wyoming; Glacier, Montana; Mount Rainier, Washington; Crater Lake, Oregon; Lassen Volcanic Yosemite, Sequoia and General Grant, California; Zion, Utah; Grand Canyon, Arizona, and Mesa Verde, Colorado.

HOUSE APPROVES AIMS OF IRISH

Express Sympathy With Aspirations of People in Resolution Reported Out

WASHINGTON, May 28.—A resolution "viewing with grave concern" conditions in Ireland and "expressing sympathy with the aspirations of the Irish people for a government of their own choice," was reported out today by the house foreign affairs committee. The vote was 11 to 7.

Pope Talks on Ireland
ROME, May 27.—Pope Benedict today received and bade farewell to Cardinal Logue, primate of Ireland. The pontiff requested the cardinal to interpret his sentiments to the cardinal's flock and to convey to them personally the apostolic benediction. Replying to an address from Cardinal Logue, Pope Benedict referred to the timeliness of the beatification of Oliver Plunkett, the first primate of Ireland and expressed his gratification at having been the instrument of God in the beatification. He wished the happiest future for Ireland and concluded by giving the benediction to Cardinal Logue as the successor of Oliver Plunkett to the Irish Episcopacy and all those representing Ireland "and particularly to my beloved Irish people."

Scene in Court
LONDON, May 27.—Two former soldiers named O'Neil and Burke, charged with shooting and wounding two constables created a scene in court here today when Burke made a dash to escape. He was promptly recaptured. When the accused men were placed in the dock the crowd

smashed the glass panels in the courtroom door and attempted to rescue them. The disturbers scattered, however, when the police leveled revolvers at them.

Soldiers Unload Munitions
QUEENSTOWN, Ireland, May 27.—Convalescent soldiers today unloaded the ammunition from the government steamer which arrived here Tuesday from the Woolwich arsenal and the steamer departed for Dublin. The dockers and railway men refused to handle the cargo of the vessel.

Ambush Officers
BELFAST, May 27.—A sergeant and a constable were ambushed today by masked men near Bellanagh, County Cavan. They fired when they were ordered to hand over their arms, and wounded two of the men in the ambush. The sergeant was shot through the thigh. Thereupon the raiders took the policemen's arms and made their escape.

RECEPTION IN ROME
ROME, May 28.—Sean O'Ceallaigh, president of the Irish parliament and diplomat extraordinary of the government of the Irish republic, gave a reception here on the occasion of the beatification of Oliver Plunkett, first bishop of Armagh. Attending was Archbishop Hanna, of San Francisco. **Fix Whiskey Price**
DUBLIN, May 27.—The chief secretary for Ireland today received at the castle a deputation representing the licensed grocers and vintners' association, who wanted sanction to fix the price of whiskey in the future. After a consultation it was agreed to fix the price at 20 pence per glass.

Armed Bandits Rob Coffee House Man

Two armed men robbed Mike Cornish, proprietor of a coffee house near the corner of Twenty-fifth street, in his place of business this morning at 2 o'clock. Little of value was obtained by the two men, a small sum of silver being removed. Both men were dark complexioned. No trace of them has yet been found.

Elks Will Dance at Lorin Farr Tonight

Ogden lodge No. 719, B. P. O. Elks will open its summer social season with a dancing party for Elks at Lorin Farr park tonight. The dancing will begin at 8:45 o'clock. Wecker's enlarged orchestra will furnish the music.

DEADLY "ANODINE" USED AS MOONSHINE, SAY AGENTS

CHARLESTON, W. Va.—The deadliest concoction to be used as a substitute for whiskey was unearthed by revenue officers here. Nearly a gallon of "anodine," composed of sixty-one parts alcohol and thirty-nine parts ether, was found. Physicians declared a small amount would cause death. Prohibition officers said that the process used by the owner was simply the application of enough water to weaken it considerably. It was to be sold as moonshine whiskey, they said.

Contradict Testimony of Banker at Hearing

MEDFORD, May 27.—Contradiction of testimony given by W. H. Gore, Medford banker by the defense, was one of the features in the hearing yesterday of the charge of conspiracy in the restraint of trade against the Utah-Idaho sugar company, the Amalgamated Sugar company, A. F. Cooper, E. C. Cullen, before the federal trade commission. The testimony was contradicted by the introduction of a letter written by Mr. Gore on December 14, 1914, to Alexander Nibley at Portland, and Mr. Nibley's reply.

Mr. Gore, who was on the stand again yesterday, did not know until the spring of 1915 that Medford would be required to finance the sugar factory if this city was chosen as its location. He testified that the late President Joseph F. Smith of the L. D. S. church had told him in the presence of Bishop C. W. Nibley and their wives on their visit of inspection here that the factory would be financed outside of Medford, and Bishop Nibley had given him to understand that Alexander Nibley's position with the company was such that he would have the final say about the Rogue River valley factory proposition.

Among today's witnesses were F. C. Bramwell, the Grants Pass banker, and his father, Franklin C. Bramwell, of Grants Pass, who worked with Alexander Nibley on the valley sugar factory project.

A feature of the hearing yesterday was the testimony relating to the alleged quashing of the independent sugar factory project of Colonel J. F. Mundy in which a number of other Medford people were interested by cornering all of the best seed in the country.

Mayor Gates testified that Alexander Nibley of the company told him in 1916 that his company, the Utah-Idaho Beet Sugar company, had bought up all the best seed for three seasons ahead. Evidence was given that the Colonel Mundy factory project, which was in process of organization and into which Frank Owen of Medford had put between \$25,000 and \$30,000, was given up when it was found that someone had cornered all the sugar beet seed in the country.

The case of George Skaggs, charged with unlawfully having intoxicating liquor in his possession, was dismissed in the city court this morning on recommendation of Assistant City Attorney Samuel Powell. Attorney Powell stated that an analysis had been made of the "evidence" which was taken in the case. He intimated that the amount of alcohol included in the concoction was not of sufficient quantity to warrant prosecution.

Skaggs was placed under \$200 bail in connection with this case.

Cheyenne Woman Asks Police to Find Her Son

Mrs. R. Fitzmorris, of Cheyenne, Wyoming, has asked Captain Jonathan Jones of the Ogden police department to keep a lookout for her son, Robert, who left Cheyenne for parts unknown about a week ago.

The boy is fifteen years old, is dark complexioned, and was wearing a brown coat and khaki trousers when he left home. Captain Jones has instructed local officers to apprehend the boy if he arrived in Ogden.

BRITONS ENCOURAGE MANUFACTURE OF PLANES

LONDON—For the purpose of encouraging the manufacturers of aeroplanes and also to determine the best type of planes for commercial and war purposes, the British government announces that competitions will be held in the late summer and that prizes will be distributed amounting to over \$300,000.

RED MINISTER OF TRADE LANDS

Conferences on Reopening of Trade and Peace Action May Be Held at London

LONDON, May 28.—Gregory Krassin, Russian bolshevik minister of trade and commerce, had only a brief word for the press when he arrived in London this afternoon. "We are here under certain obligations," said the minister, "and can say nothing now. But you will hear from us—perhaps in a few days."

M. Krassin was greeted by a large number of Russians as, accompanied by his wife, he stepped off the train. He proceeded to the hotel where M. Nogin, M. Rosovsky and M. Kliskhe, members of the Russian trade commission, have been quartered for the past two weeks.

This, coupled with the fact that M. Krassin is coming as the head of the co-operative delegation, would seem to give ground for the reports that M. Nogin and his colleagues who have been in communication with the foreign office, have partly cleared the way for decisions to which the assent of a plenipotentiary such as M. Krassin is said to be necessary.

Should these preliminaries be satisfactorily concluded it is believed that allied representatives may be appointed to enter into formal trade reopening or peace conferences. It is even suggested that M. Krassin may be invited to attend the Spa conference.

ASKS DISMISSAL OF DIVORCE CASE

Ivan Leigh Sherman Alleged "Mystery Disappearance" Man Denies Charges

In an answer to a complaint filed against Ivan Leigh Sherman by his wife Mary Sherman, asking divorce, Mr. Sherman denies allegations contained in the complaint and asks for dismissal of the action. Mrs. Sherman's complaint was filed after Sherman was alleged to have gone to Salt Lake with his brother's wife. His alleged leaving of a bank book, a bicycle and a bloody iron bar at the banks of the Ogden river before his visit to Salt Lake led his family to believe that he was the victim of foul play. He appeared at the police station a few days later and is said by police officers to have admitted going to Salt Lake with the wife of his brother.
