

BILLION MARKS RAISED AMONG RUSS IN SWEDEN

Former Russian Minister of War With Gen. Yudenitch Concentrating Army.

PLANS Laid FOR ENTERING RUSSIA

Officer is Sent to Paris to Enlist Morak-Support For Intervention.

COPENHAGEN, June 29.—Private cables from Kovno, Lithuania, says Alexander H. Guchkoff, Russian minister of war and navy in 1917, and associated with General Yudenitch in the offensive against Petrograd last fall, is concentrating near Koenigsberg a volunteer army of 6,000 well armed men for a new invasion of Russia. Guchkoff is reported to be in control of one billion marks raised among Russians in Sweden by a cousin of the late Admiral Kalchak, head of the anti-Russian government of the White Russian government of the Bolsheviks, and General Volkoff, an intimate friend of the former Emperor Nicholas. Guchkoff is said to favor a plan of entering Russia by way of Lithuania and Latvia. The report is causing great anxiety among the statesmen of those countries.

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
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AMERICANISM IS SLOGAN OF 1920 CAMPAIGN

Declares Nation Needs No Foreign Counsel to Point Way of American Duty.

WASHINGTON, June 29.—Declaring the nation needs no counsel of American duty, Senator Harding, Republican nominee for president, in his first campaign speech today, urged the preservation of Americanism as the first and highest endeavor of all citizens of the Republic.

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UNSEATING OF REED BRINGS LOUD APPLAUSE

AUDITORIUM, June 29.—The probability of a fight over the report of the credentials committee, which had voted not to seat Senator Reed as a delegate from Missouri, diminished with reports that Reed would not carry his fight to the floor of the convention. The Reed case was the only ripple in sight on the smooth waters of the convention, and his decision not to carry the contest further robbed the day of its only prospect of excitement.

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INCREASE FARE FOR PASSENGERS BEING URGED

Interstate Commerce Commission Hears Plea of Railroads For More Revenue.

HIGHER PASSENGER RATES TO THE FORE

WASHINGTON, June 29.—Increase of passenger fares as well as freight rates to permit railroads and electric lines to operate both branches of their service at a profit was urged today before the interstate commerce commission by Clifford Thorne of Chicago, representing shippers, and Charles L. Henry of Indianapolis, chairman of the American electric railway association. Their pleas for higher passenger rates brought that phase of the revenue question to the fore for the first time since the rate hearings began. Mr. Henry contended that traction lines, with freight making up only a small portion of their business, could not absorb passenger losses if an increase is allowed in freight rates only.

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INDIANS GIVEN THIRD DEGREE IN JENKINS CASE

Claim They Were Suspended in Air, Struck and Threatened With Death.

MEXICO CITY, June 29.—Several Indians examined regarding their previous testimony in the case of William O. Jenkins, former American consular agent at Puebla, testified today that they were suspended in the air, struck and threatened with death by shooting unless they agreed to testify against Jenkins, according to a Puebla dispatch to El Universal. Jenkins was kidnaped by the bandit, Federico Cordova, last fall, and later was charged with complicity in his own capture. The testimony is being heard by the third criminal court of Puebla, Ignacio Vasquez, former secretary of the second criminal court, declared court papers were stolen to damage the case against Jenkins, and the judge was disposed where he was about to free the American. The bandit Cordova was cross-examined for four hours today, but his testimony was not disclosed.
