
"I don't think we'd find it if we hunted for a blue moon," said Tingaling finally, mopping his round face. "Tommy, I don't believe you've got any rent money at all."

PARTNERS IN GUILT

The Chinese, who are the most logical people on earth, have a comprehensive way of dealing out justice. When a crime is committed they not only punish the wrong doer but every one who could, or should, have prevented it.

Thus, not long ago, in a report in a Shanghai newspaper of the court proceedings, there was an account of a crazy man who had suddenly developed a homicidal mania and killed two people. The maniac was put in an asylum and every member of his family, even to remote cousins, and the entire population of the village in which he lived, were fined because they knew the man, he mentally unbalanced, yet had taken no measure to protect the public against him.

In another case a youth was convicted of having robbed his employer. He was sent to jail, and his father sentenced to a severe flogging for having reared a thief, and for having neglected to instill the principles of honor and honesty in his son.

We of the western world might well adopt this Chinese system of administering justice. For no man sins by himself alone, and we are all more or less responsible for the evil done by those about us.
