

OFFICER OF WHOLESALE COMPANY GIVEN GRUELLING EXAMINATION BY CHIEF COUNSEL FOR HAMPTON

With D. N. Straup of Salt Lake, former justice of the supreme court of Utah, as chief counsel for the defense, a bitter battle is being waged in Judge A. E. Pratt's division of the district court to clear Walter M. Hampton, former bookkeeper of the Golden Rule store of a charge of forgery and embezzlement.

Tense situations came this morning when H. Carlisle Stevens, secretary of the Golden Rule Mercantile company and for the Johnson-Stevens company, was subjected to a grueling examination by Judge Straup. The first intimation that the usual routine of the trial was to be disregarded for the time being, came when Judge Straup suddenly rose to his feet and asked Mr. Stevens if it were not true that he had signed and taken to his home while Edward M. Tower, manager of the Golden Rule store, was being questioned on the stand yesterday afternoon.

"Absolutely not," answered Mr. Stevens. "After the check was drawn, didn't you get cold feet and fail to make the deposit?" snapped Judge Straup.

"It is not true," answered the witness. "I know nothing about it and had no responsibility in the matter."

A few minutes later Mr. Stevens, in answer to question, declared he had never seen the \$12,000 check alleged to have been drawn by Hampton in Salt Lake.

Mr. Stevens, in answer to question, explained the relation of the Golden Rule store to the Johnson-Stevens company and said the general office of the Golden Rule are in the Johnson-Stevens building. He said that Hampton was employed last December as bookkeeper for the Golden Rule accounts.

DENIES BOOKS OFF BALANCE The witness declared that Hampton had no authority to fill in checks with the exception of the payroll checks which were unsigned. Mr. Stevens admitted having kept the accounts before Hampton was employed.

When asked if the books were not off balance in an amount approximately \$75,000 when Hampton was hired, he was emphatic in denial.

Mr. Stevens was questioned as to whether he was asked by Hampton for a loan of money and declared he was not approached for loans. He said he knew little of the personal affairs of Hampton but had been told by him that he was to be married in June and was planning to either rent or buy a home.

Manager Tower of the Golden Rule store was on the stand this morning and was questioned in regard to the check book and checks of the store. He was followed by A. D. Shaw, assistant manager of the store who testified he had given Hampton the store check book a few days before Hampton's arrest.

Georothy McBratney, bookkeeper for the Johnson-Stevens company, said she saw the check book on Hampton's desk and explained the system in the cancelling of checks that were not used. It was brought out in her cross-examination that she did not make the marks of cancellation on the stubs of the two checks which Hampton is alleged to have cashed.

The jurors in the Hampton case are Thomas J. Blakeley, John W. Gibson, Jr., Alma Langlois, Albert Powell, Thomas J. Parr, W. H. Loos, Lester J. Folkman and Joseph Woods.
