

NAME ENGINEER ON CANYON ROAD

E. E. Grimes of Ogden Selected as Special Project Engineer

E. E. Grimes, of the state road commission offices in this city, has been assigned as special project engineer for the Ogden canyon road work.

Under the agreement reached following a lengthy discussion regarding the question of subsistence allowance, the commission decided that Mr. Grimes would receive a straight salary of \$262.50 per month and would have an allowance for garage rental for the automobile which the state allows for transportation.

Complaints of Ogden residents, whose names were not disclosed, regarding the expenditure of public funds, were aired at the meeting of the commission, it is reported.

COOK OUT FOR OFFICE OF CLERK

Former Deputy Says He Will Seek Nomination at Republican Convention

W. P. Cook, ex-deputy clerk and auditor of Weber county today, announces that he is a candidate for the office of clerk and auditor at the Republican county convention.

Mr. Cook made the following declaration with respect to his resignation:

"I refused to resign voluntarily until nominations were made, but when faced with the question of waiving my constitutional rights or my job, I elected to stand on my rights and submit my case to the people, whom I have served both in war and in peace. I felt that in view of the fact that Mr. Farr was an appointee like myself in the clerk's office that it was just as fair that I should be allowed to retain my position in the office while seeking the nomination, as clerk, as it is for Mr. Farr, who was not elected by the people, to seek the nomination on the Democratic ticket while serving as clerk. Mr. Farr, however, took an extremely partisan view of the matter, and forced my resignation. I am glad the principles of justice for which my party stands, are so grounded within me that they outshine the almighty dollar."

On his discharge from the military service in April, 1918, and during Mr. Storey's Republican administration, Mr. Cook was appointed deputy clerk and auditor and has served as clerk of the district court up to this time. He has studied law for a number of years in the offices of prominent attorneys where he has acted as stenographer and law clerk and is an expert accountant having audited for some of the largest public service corporations on the coast.

URGE STATE TO KEEP UP ROADS

Local Federal Engineer Criticizes Maintenance of Ogden-Hooper Highway

B. J. Finch, district engineer of the United States Bureau of Public Roads has urged the state road commission to take steps to properly maintain the Ogden-Hooper highway.

It is urged to construct roads if they are allowed to become ruined for lack of maintenance within a short time after completion.

The road in question has not yet been opened a full year. While it is not of the highest type of road construction, it was known at the time the agreement to construct the road was reached that maintenance charges would in all probability begin soon after the road was completed.

Members of the commission were planning a trip to the northern part of the state today, and announced that they would call on the highway engineer in question to determine what maintenance would be required. Mr. Finch's letter addressed to Ira Browning, state engineer and secretary of the commission, reads:

"A recent inspection of project No. 2, Ogden-Hooper road, indicates that nothing is being done toward maintenance of this road. It has already suffered severely by reason of this neglect and it is feared that when heavy hauling begins in another month, it will be completely ruined unless given immediate attention. It is respectfully called to your attention that your department and the state of Utah have pledged themselves to maintain roads built with federal aid, and that in any case it is useless to construct roads if they are allowed to become ruined for lack of maintenance within a short time after completion. It is therefore suggested that you bring this matter to the attention of the state road commission, if you have not been authorized to expend the necessary funds on this road, with a view to having the road put under maintenance immediately, to prevent damage and to have the damage already done repaired as soon as weather conditions in the autumn will permit.

Narrow Wagon Tires Damage State Roads

Damage to highways throughout the state by use of wagon tires of a narrow width prohibited by state laws, are costing the state thousands of dollars annually, according to B. J. Finch of the United States bureau of public roads here.

Letters asking the enforcement of the tire ordinance will be written to all sheriffs of the state, it is said. Mr. Finch also stated that some implement dealers are still selling—or at any rate have sold since the wide tire law went into effect—wagons that violate the state laws.

OGDEN SECOND IN HEALTH SURVEY

Both This City and Salt Lake Rank High With Other Towns

That the two largest Utah cities rank high among other cities of their class in respect to co-operative measures taken with the United States Public Health service and other agencies by combatting the prevalence of social diseases, is information given out in a report of the United States Public Health service.

Ogden stands second in the class of cities that have from 25,000 to 50,000 population. Salt Lake is second in its class from 100,000 to 500,000. The survey was made February 1, 1926 and it is not intended to indicate freedom from prevalence of the disease combatted but rather the effectiveness and vigor of the measures taken in combatting the disease.

Detroit heads the cities of 500,000 and over with 894. Los Angeles is second, with 670 and New York third, with 627. Chicago runs seventh of the ten cities in this class with 498 points.

Railroad Operates Many Motor Trucks

On one of the smaller railroads in Illinois there are being operated motor trucks instead of railroad trains. Each truck is of three-ton capacity and has a four wheel drive. It carries thirty passengers in comfort and hauls a five ton trailer loaded with freight, rams and sand boxes are used. It is said that the truck makes the thirty-two-mile run of this railroad on six gallons of gasoline with full load.

Many Causes for Engine Overheating
