

WHAT'LL I WEAR TODAY? BABY HEALTH ADVICE



- Apples Sugar Powdered cinnamon Butter Water Very short baking powder dough Put a small teacup upside down in the center of a buttered pudding dish. CORN SALAD.

- 12 ears corn 1 head cabbage 1 red pepper 1 green pepper 1 tablespoon salt 1 tablespoon ground mustard 2 onions 1 cup sugar 2 quarts vinegar Cut corn from cob. Chop cabbage and peppers and onions. Mix sugar, salt and mustard. Put all ingredients into preserving kettle. Cook thirty minutes, stirring occasionally. Put into sterilized jars and seal.
