

Landing of Pilgrims Will Be Celebrated

Schools of Ogden will take a leading part in bringing about proper observance of the centenary of the landing of Plymouth Rock, according to Superintendent W. Karl Hopkins of the Ogden school system.

State Superintendent L. J. Muir has sent out the following appeal to all superintendents and principals in the state urging all to observe the tercentenary.

"The present school year will witness throughout the nation the celebration of the 300th anniversary of the pilgrims. This occasion is a wonderful opportunity for the renewal of our national patriotism. No state in the land is more loyal to American ideals and institutions than is Utah. Her success in the observance of this great national anniversary will depend largely upon the part played by her schools. It is fitting, therefore, that the state department of education should request of the schools of Utah that they devote themselves to this work.

"Two specific celebrations are planned by the state committee having charge of this matter. The first of these is a special pilgrim tercentenary celebration program to be held on December 21, and the second is a pilgrim pageant to be given in the open air next spring. It is urged that each community participate in these two events.

"Accordingly, the junior and senior high schools everywhere should at once devote themselves to the development of materials for the program. Contests in pageant writing will assist in producing the needed material. Interesting stories in pilgrim history and Utah pioneer life will furnish the background for these contests. The class work in history, English and civics can easily be adapted to this end. And in all this occasion provides a fine opportunity for vitalized American education.

"Professor B. Ronald Lewis of the University of Utah is chairman of the state committee fostering this movement. This committee is ready to aid you in any way desired. Utah's success in observing this great national celebration will depend upon the contribution made by her schools. The department of education commends this worthy activity and urges the educational forces of Utah to enter upon it with enthusiasm."

I read with a great deal of interest your article in yesterday's morning paper relative to the Republican convention held at the Orpheum theatre Saturday afternoon at which the Republican party's candidates for the county and city offices were selected. I believe the public should know what the young woman said, and then judge whether or not she swung the vote.

Those of us who know Mr. Holther cannot but laud his war record. A thousand years will never leave the thought dim in my mind that a million boys were willing to die, to give their all, that America's girlhood, America's motherhood, might always be as unsold, as pure, as unquestioned, and as beautiful as they believed it was.

PRICE-FIXING ON FARM PRODUCTS IS OPPOSED

CHICAGO, Sept. 20.—The American Farm Federation Sunday adopted resolutions demanding representation for farmers and stock raisers in the cabinet and opposing government price-fixing of farm products. The resolutions also demanded that the government "make a study of the agricultural products and cost of producing so that frequent, abnormal and ruinous fluctuations in prices of farm products may be avoided" and urge revision of the tariff and agricultural and farm products.

The resolutions "especially demand that the secretary of agriculture be a practical farmer."
